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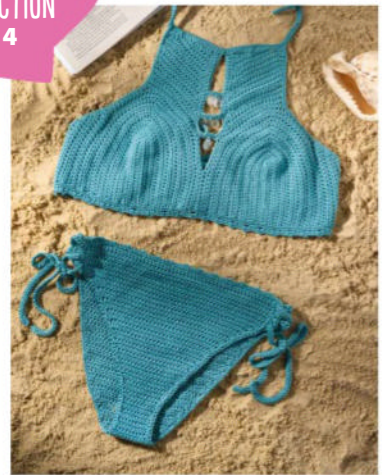

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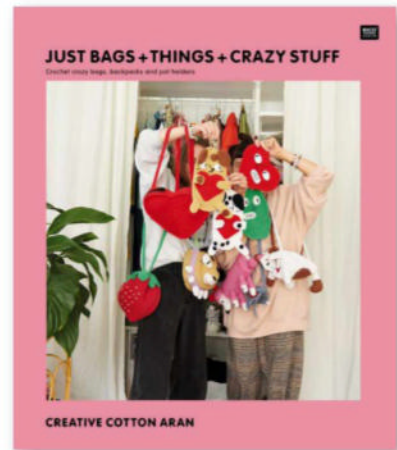

Crochet hacks with Lily Chin



REDISCOVERING THE SLIP KNOT

I'm Lily, and I've been teaching yarncrafts internationally since 1989. I was named to the Crochet Hall of Fame in 2015 and have been involved in some aspect of the fashion industry since age 13, designing for magazines and yarn companies since 1982 and working for designers such as Ralph Lauren and Diane von Fürstenberg. I was officially named 'fastest crocheter in the world' in a 2002 international competition and have authored books on knitting and crochet since 1999. I've made hundreds of appearances on television and in print media, and am on the season 13 and 14 cast of PBS' *Knit and Crochet Now!* But most of all, I'm proud of my teaching skills. Come and learn with me!

So you think you know how to make a slip knot. But do you really? There are actually two types of slip knot – we'll call them A and B. Type A is when the tail end of the yarn closes the knot. Type B is when the yarn end closes the knot.

If you work your slip knot in the manner shown in illustration 1, you'll get Type A. The result is depicted in illustration 2 – the tail gets longer when the knot gets smaller.

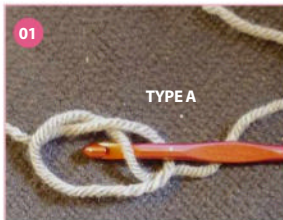
The method shown in illustration 3 is Type B. Illustration 4 is the result – notice how the tail remains the same length when the knot gets smaller?

So, why does it matter? Well, if you create a Type A slip knot, the beginning of the chain can become distorted. Compare the very first chain (next to the slip knot) made in illustration 5 (Type A) versus the one in illustration 6 (Type B). In illustration 5, if the tail was to be yanked on, that very first chain could distort and become too small to work into. After working into the chain, it could become too large, and at the very end, it could just be too malleable.

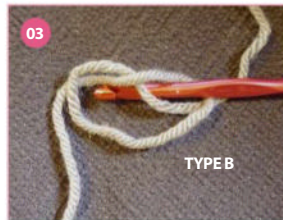
So, in most instances, it can be better to rely on a Type B slip knot. However, in the next article, you'll find a use for a Type A slip knot and discover how it can actually be desirable.

BEACH BLANKET

Geo print? Check. Beautiful colours? Check. Tassels? Check. Esme Crick's beach blanket is just what your summer holiday needs

- King Cole Bamboo Cotton (50% bamboo viscose, 50% cotton, 100g/230m), 3 balls of each: **Yarn B** Old Gold (625), **Yarn C** Sea Breeze (3331), 1 ball of each: **Yarn A** Denim (619), **Yarn D** Dusty Pink (618)
- A 5mm (US H/8) hook
- A tassel maker

TENSION

Tension is not critical for this project, but it may affect the yarn quantities required

MEASUREMENTS

Blanket measures approx 60x100cm (26½x39½in) excluding tassels

ABBREVIATIONS

mtr (mosaic treble) Tr in skipped st of the same colour 3 rows below, working in front of the ch-sps on prev 2 rows

For a full list, see page 86

NOTES

Plain stripes in Yarns A and B are worked before and after the main mosaic crochet section, which is worked using Yarns B and C. The Blanket is then edged, and tassels are added to finish.

There is a Chart on page 88, which you will need to refer to. Each row needs to be read twice, once from right to left and then once from left to right. One colour is used on each row. The colour used on each row is shown by

the colour of the first st. If a second colour appears on the row you need to skip the number of sts shown and work a ch for each skipped st plus 1. For example, if you skip 2 sts you will make a ch3. On the next row using that colour you will work an mtr into each skipped st. The first few rows of the Chart have been written out to guide you.

Do not fasten off the yarn when changing colour, the yarn can be carried up the side of the work to be joined on subsequent rows. If you wish to adjust the width of the blanket, the pattern works to a repeat multiple of 18 + 6 for your starting chain, then follow the pattern from Row 1.

BEACH BLANKET

Using Yarn A, ch96.

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook and in each ch to end, turn. [95 sts]

Rows 2-4 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), dc in each st to end, turn.

Fasten off.

Join Yarn B in first st.

Rows 5-8 Ch1, dc in each st to end, turn.

Fasten off.

Join Yarn A in first st.

Rows 9-12 Ch1, dc in each st to end, turn.

Fasten off.

Join Yarn B in first st.

Rows 13-14 Ch1, dc in each st to end, turn.

Change to Yarn C.

Row 15 Ch1, 1dc, ch2, skip 1 st, 6dc, ch4, skip 3 sts, 1dc, ch4, skip 3 sts, *11dc, ch4, skip 3 sts, 1dc, ch4, skip 3 sts; rep from * to last 8 sts, 6dc, ch2, skip 1 st, 1dc, turn.

Row 16 Ch1, 1dc, ch2, skip ch-2 sp, 6dc, ch4, skip ch-4 sp, 1dc, ch4, skip ch-4 sp, *11dc, ch4,

skip ch-4 sp, 1dc, ch4, skip ch-4 sp; rep from * to last 8 sts, 6dc, ch2, skip ch-2 sp, 1dc, turn.

Change to Yarn B.

Row 17 Ch1, 1dc, 1mtr, ch4, skip 3 sts, 3dc, 3mtr, ch2, skip 1 st, 3mtr, 3dc, *ch6, skip 5 sts, 3dc, 3mtr, ch2, skip 1 st, 3mtr, 3dc; rep from * to last 5 sts, ch4, skip 3 sts, 1mtr, 1dc, turn.

Row 18 Ch1, 2dc, ch4, skip ch-4 sp, 6dc, ch2, skip ch-2 sp, 6dc, *ch6, skip ch-6 sp, 6dc, ch2, skip ch-2 sp, 6dc; rep from * to last 5 sts, ch4, skip ch-4 sp, 2dc, turn.

Change to Yarn C.

Rows 19-44 Cont in pattern set using the Chart as you work.

Rows 45-208 Rep Rows 17-44 another 5 times, then rep Rows 17-30

Change to Yarn B.

Row 209 Ch1, dc in each st and mtr in each skipped st to end, turn.

Row 210 Ch1, dc in each st to end, turn.

Change to Yarn A.

Rows 211-222 As Row 210, working 4 rows in Yarn A, 4 rows in Yarn B, and 4 rows in Yarn A.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

EDGING

Edging is worked along the 2 long edges of the Blanket. With RS facing, join Yarn A in bottom-right corner.

Row 1 (RS) Ch1, (dc in next 3 row-ends, skip next row-end) rep to end, turn.

Rows 2-4 Ch1, dc in each st to end, turn.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

Rep along opposite edge of Blanket.

TO FINISH

Using Yarn D, make 18 tassels.

Attach evenly across the short edges of Blanket. Weave in any rem ends.



BEACH BAG

Natalie Beard's bag will keep all your seaside essentials safe, with plenty of room for sunscreen, water and your current WIP!

- King Cole Raffia (100% cellulose rayon, 50g/114m), 2 balls of Natural (1456)
- King Cole Bamboo Cotton DK (50% bamboo, 50% cotton, 100g/230m) 1 ball of Denim (619)
- A 4.5mm (US 7) hook

TENSION

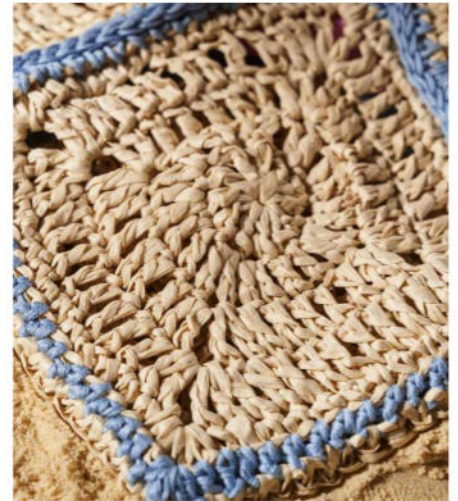
Tension is not critical for this project, but it may affect the yarn quantities required

MEASUREMENTS

Bag measures approx 50x35cm (19¾x13¾in)

NOTES

Bag is made up of 12 Squares, which are sewn together. A Handle is worked separately and sewn in place at the end.



BEACH BAG

SQUARES (MAKE 12)

Using Natural, make a magic loop.

Round 1 Ch3 *(counts as a tr throughout), 11tr in loop, ss to top of beg ch-3. [12 sts]

Round 2 Ch3, tr in st at base of ch-3, 2tr in each st around, ss to top of beg ch-3. [24 sts]

Round 3 Ch3, tr in next 4 sts, *(2tr, ch2, 2tr) in next st, tr in next 5 sts; rep from * twice more, (2tr, ch2, 2tr) in final st, ss to top of beg ch-3. [36 sts]

Round 4 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), *dc in each st to ch-2 sp, (2dc, ch2, 2dc) in ch-sp; rep from * around, ss to beg dc. [52 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Denim in any st.

Round 5 Ch1, *htr in each st to ch-2 sp, (2htr, ch2, 2htr) in ch-2 sp; rep from * around, ss to beg htr. [68 sts]

Fasten off.

HANDLES (MAKE 2)

Using Natural, ch5.

Row 1 Htr in second ch from hook and each ch across, turn. [4 sts]

Rows 2-50 Ch1, htr in each st across, turn.

Fasten off.

TO MAKE UP

Using Denim, sew 6 Squares together in a 3x2 formation. Rep with the remaining 6 Squares. Place Panels together with RS facing out.

Join Natural in top-right and work next row through both pieces to join the sides and the base of the Bag.

Row 1 (RS) Ch1, dc in corner, 136dc evenly down short edge, 2dc in corner, 204dc evenly across base, 2dc in corner, 136dc evenly up short edge.

Work around the top of the bag in rounds.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, htr evenly around top of Bag, ss to beg htr.

Round 2 (RS) Ch1, htr in each st around, ss to beg htr.

Fasten off.

Sew the Handles to the top of the Bag.

NECKLACE

A beach collection isn't complete without shells! Emma Leith's choker beautifully combines soft yarn with pretty shell beads

■ King Cole Bamboo Cotton DK (50% bamboo, 50% cotton, 100g/230m), 1 ball each of Old Gold (625), Sea Breeze (3331), Dusty Pink (618), Denim (619)

■ A 4mm (US G/6) hook

■ A 3mm (US C/2 or D/3) hook

■ 14 shell beads

TENSION

Tension is not critical for this project, but it may affect the yarn quantities required

MEASUREMENTS

Necklace measures 44cm (17¼in)

ABBREVIATIONS

picot Ch4, ss to forth ch from hook

join shell Remove loop from hook, thread loop through hole on shell bead and place back on hook

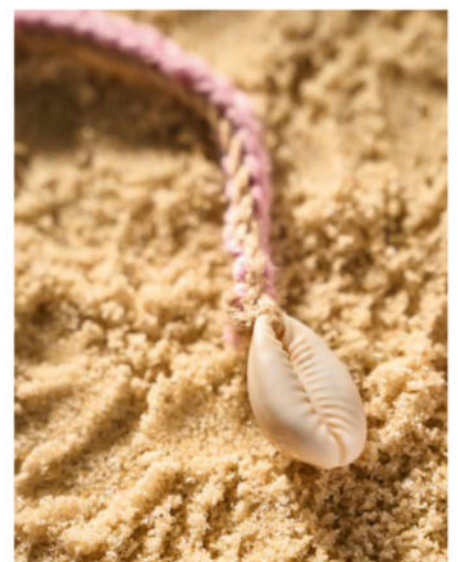
NOTES

When changing colour mid-row, twist ends together. Pick up the new colour in the last yrh of the previous stitch. Carry the unused strands of yarn across the WS of the work.

NECKLACE

Using a 4mm hook and 2 strands of yarn, make a cord as follows:

Leaving a starting tail of 15cm for both yarns, make a slip knot using Old Gold and place on hook. Using Dusty Pink, make a skip knot and place on hook alongside first slip knot. Pull second slip knot through first, leaving 1 loop of Dusty Pink on hook and Dusty Pink as working yarn. *Place hook over and behind Old Gold to



pick up so that the yarn hangs behind your hook, ch1 using Dusty Pink, pulling yarn through both loops on hook; repeat from * 105 times more. [106 sts]

Fasten off leaving 15cm long tails.

Join Old Gold in 31st st of cord,

Row 1 (RS) Ch2 (counts as first htr), htr in next 45 sts, turn leaving remaining sts unworked. [46 htr]

Join Sea Breeze in first st of Row 1.

Row 2 (RS) Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), dc in first st, *ch3, skip 2 sts, dc in next st; rep from * across, turn.

[15 ch-3 sps, 16 dc]

Fasten off.

With WS facing, join Dusty Pink in first ch-3 sp.

Row 3 (WS) Ch1, dc in first sp, (picot, dc in next ch-3 sp) rep across. [14 picots]

Fasten off.

With RS facing, join Denim in first dc.

Row 4 (RS) *Ch3, bring picot to RS, ss in next dc; repeat from * across.

Fasten off.

Rejoin Denim in first ch-3 sp.

Row 5 (RS) Ch1, *(2dc, ch2, join shell, ch1, ss to first ch of ch-2, 2dc in same ch-3 sp) repeat from * across.

Fasten off.

MAKE CLASP

Join shell to cord by threading one tail-end through shell and securing with a knot. Weave in ends.

Make a slip knot at other end using both tail ends held together and ensure opening can fit over shell. Tie ends together at base of slip knot to secure it and weave in ends.

BIKINI

Hook up Cara Medus' on-trend bikini to wear on long, languid days in the sun

■ King Cole Bamboo Cotton DK (50% bamboo viscose, 50% cotton, 100g/230m), Sea Breeze (3331) – see table for measurements and yarn quantities

■ A 3mm (US C/2 or D/3) hook for edging

■ A 3.5mm (US E/4) hook

■ 7 shell beads (available from bit.ly/41LABgw)

■ Stitch markers

TENSION

18 sts and 15 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) over half treble crochet using a 3.5mm hook or size needed to obtain stated tension

ABBREVIATIONS

2-inc row Ch1, 2htr in first st, htr in each st to last st, 2htr in last st, turn [2 sts inc]

4-inc row Ch2 (does not count as st), (tr, htr) in first st, 2htr in next st, htr in each st to last 2 sts, 2htr in next st, (htr, tr) in last st, turn [4 sts inc]

fdc (foundation double crochet) To work the st before the gap, insert hook into st, *yrh and pull yarn through st, ch1, yrh and draw through both loops on hook** To work fdc sts, insert hook into ch-1 of previous st and rep from * to **. On the last fdc of the gap, replace the ch-1 of the fdc with a ss into the st to be joined

NOTES

The sizing is intended to be flexible. You can make the Cups of the Top the size you need them, and then add the number of rows you

need for the Bust Band. The Bust Band isn't intended to meet at the centre back, leaving a gap for a Tie. The Bottoms have Ties at the side to make the hip width adjustable. All pieces are sized to have negative ease, that is to say that they need to be smaller than actual body measurements in order to fit well. Blocking is recommended to help the centre detail and edging of the Top to lie evenly.

BIKINI

BOTTOMS

BACK

With a 3.5mm hook, ch45 (53: 65: 73: 81: 89) loosely.

HIP SECTION

Row 1 (RS) Htr in second ch from hook (beg ch1 does not count as st), htr in each ch to end, turn. [44 (52: 64: 72: 80: 88) sts]

Row 2 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), htr in each st to end, turn.

Work 3 (3: 4: 5: 6: 6) more rows as Row 2.

LEG SHAPING

Next row Skip first st, ch1, dc in next st, htr to last 2 sts, dc in next st, turn leaving rem sts unworked. [Only htr sts count as sts to be worked for next row, so there are 40 (48: 60: 68: 76: 84) sts]

SIZES 8-10, 12-14, 16-18, 20-22, 24-26 ONLY

Next row As Row 2. [40 (48: 60: 68: 76: -) sts]

Next row (Dec row) Ch1, htr2tog, htr in each st to last 2 sts, htr2tog, turn. [2 sts dec]

Rep last 2 rows 13 (10: 6: 3: 1: -) times more. [12 (26: 46: 60: 72: -) sts]

ALL SIZES

Next row (Dec row) Ch1, htr2tog, htr in each st to last 2 sts, htr2tog, turn. [2 sts dec]

Rep Decrease Row 0 (7: 16: 23: 28: 34) time more. [10 (10: 12: 12: 14: 14) sts]

Work 0 (1: 2: 1: 2: 2) more rows as Row 2.

[35 (37: 40: 41: 44: 46) rows]

Do not fasten off.

FRONT

LEG SHAPING

***Next row** Ch1, htr in each st to end, turn.

Put a stitch marker in the end of this row to help with keeping track of the Front rows.

Rep last row 8 (7: 8: 7: 8: 8) times more.

Work 1 (2: 2: 3: 3: 4) 2-inc rows. [12 (14: 16: 18: 20: 22) sts, 10 (10: 11: 11: 12: 13) rows of Front]

*Work 2 (2: 2: 1: 1: 1) rows of htr without shaping foll by 3 (3: 3: 3: 5: 5) 2-inc rows. Rep from * 1 (1: 1: 2: 1: 1) time more. [24 (26: 28: 36: 40: 42) sts]

Work 0 (1: 0: 0: 0: 0) row of htr without shaping foll by 0 (1: 2: 0: 0: 1) 2-inc rows. [24 (28: 32: 36: 40: 44) sts, 20 (22: 23: 23: 24: 26) rows of Front]

*Work 1 row of htr without shaping foll by 1 (1:

Work 1 (0: 1: 0: 0: 0) row of htr without shaping foll by 1 (2: 0: 1: 0: 6) 4-inc rows. [44 (52: 64: 72: 80: 88) sts, 30 (32: 34: 34: 36: 38) rows of Front]

HIP SECTION

Work 5 (5: 6: 7: 8: 8) rows of htr without shaping, turn, do not fasten off.

TOP EDGING

****Row 1 (RS)** Ch1 (does not count as st), 2dc in first st, dc in each st to last st, 2dc in last st, turn. [46 (54: 66: 74: 82: 90) sts]

Row 2 Ch1, *dc in next 2 sts, ch2, skip 2 sts; rep from and to last 2 sts, dc in last 2 sts, turn. Change to 3mm hook.

Row 3 Ch1, *dc in next 2 sts, (dc, ch-2 picot, dc) in ch-2 sp; rep from * to last 2 sts, dc in last 2 sts, do not turn or fasten off.

Rotate to work in row-ends of Edging and Hip and Leg Section.

With 3mm hook, 10 (10: 13: 13: 16: 16) dc evenly into row-ends of Edging and Hip Section, then change to 3.5mm hook and dc evenly along Leg Shaping edges of Front and Back.**

When you reach the edging on the Hip Section, stop and place a marker in the working loop to prevent it unravelling.

With a second ball of yarn, rejoin in opposite side of foundation ch with RS facing. Rep Top and Leg Edging from ** to **, then when you reach the Hip Section, change to a 3mm hook and work 10 (10: 13: 13: 16: 16) dc evenly into row-ends, turn.

Cont with Rows 1 and 2 of Lacing Loops below.

LACING LOOPS

Row 1 (WS) Ch1, dc in first st, (ch3, skip 2 sts, dc in next st) 3 (3: 4: 4: 5: 5) times, turn.

Row 2 (4dc in next ch-3 sp, ss in next dc) 3 (3: 4: 4: 5: 5) times.

Fasten off.

Return to stitch marker in live loop and replace 3mm hook in loop. Work dc along Hip Section edge as before and cont with Lacing Loops.

Fasten off.

Rejoin yarn with WS facing and 3mm hook on remaining Hip Section edges to work Lacing Loops.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

TIES (MAKE 2)

With a 3.5mm hook, ch2, fdc beginning in second ch from hook until length measures 80 (80: 100: 100: 120: 120)cm when stretched (or length needed for fit required).

Fasten off, weaving ends back into ch. Lace through the loops at each side and tie.

TOP

BRA CUPS (MAKE 2)

With a 3.5mm hook, ch22.

Row 1 Htr in third ch from hook (skipped ch count as ch-2 sp), htr in each ch to end, turn. [20 sts and ch-2 sp]

Row 2 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), htr in each st, 6htr in ch-2 sp, rotate to work in opposite side of foundation ch, htr in each st of foundation ch, turn. [46 sts]

Row 3 Ch1, 22htr, 2htr in next st, pm in second of these sts, 2htr in next st, pm in first of these sts, htr in each st to end, turn. [48 sts]

Row 4 Ch1, htr in each st to end, working 2htr in each marked st and moving markers up to the 2 central sts in each row, turn. [50 sts]

Repeat Row 4 a further 9 (10: 12: 13: 15: 16) times. [68 (70: 74: 76: 80: 82) sts]

Fasten off and turn so that other side is facing for the next row.

The right-hand edge of the Cup will be at the centre. Count 17 (18: 19: 20: 21: 21) sts from right bottom edge and rejoin yarn in next st with ss.

HALTER TOP

Row 1 Ss in next st, dc in next st, htr2tog over next 2 sts, 17 (17: 18: 19: 20: 21) htr, turn. [21 (21: 22: 23: 24: 25) sts including joining ss]

Row 2 Ch1, 2htr in first st, 14 (14: 15: 16: 17: 18) htr, htr2tog over next 2 sts, turn leaving rem sts unworked. [17 (17: 18: 19: 20: 21) sts]

Row 3 Ch1, htr2tog over first 2 sts, htr in each st to last st, 2htr in last st, turn.

Row 4 Ch1, 2htr in first st, htr in each st to last 2 sts, htr2tog over last 2 sts, turn.

Rep Rows 3 and 4 until Cup and these Top rows measure 23 (25: 27: 29: 31: 33)cm from base of Cup to highest point, ending with a Row 3.

This will be the length of the finished Top before adding the straps, minus 1.5 cm for the top and bottom edging. Adjust if desired at this point by adding or removing rows.

STRAIGHTEN TOP EDGE

Row 1 Skip first st, ss in next 2 sts, dc in next 2 sts, htr in each st to last 2 sts, htr2tog over last 2 sts, turn. [15 (15: 16: 17: 18: 19) sts]

Row 2 Ch1, htr2tog, htr in each st to last 4 htr, dc in next 2 htr, ss in next 2 htr, turn. [10 (10: 11: 12: 13: 14) sts]

Row 3 Ss across to first htr, ss in first 2 htr, dc in each st to last 2 sts, htr2tog, turn. [3 (3: 4: 5: 6: 7) sts not including ss]

Row 4 Ch1, htr2tog, dc in next 2 sts, ss in next 2 sts.

Fasten off leaving rem sts unworked.

CENTRE DETAIL

Turn one Cup/Top piece over and align the centre edge of both Cups, sewing them together from the base over 11 (11: 12: 12: 13: 13) sts. This will leave 6 (7: 7: 8: 8: 8) sts of the Cup unworked before the sts of Row 1 of the Top.

Fasten off.

Taking whichever you choose to be the RS, rejoin yarn with RS facing to work down the



central edge of the Top piece. Following instructions below, you will fdc to bridge the gap between the Cups (see Special Abbreviations) and back up the other side. You may need to adjust the number of fdc worked across the central gap; the aim is that the fdc sts form a curve when the piece is laid flat and the top corners meet in the centre:

Row 1 (RS) Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), dc evenly into row-ends of Top until you reach point at which Top piece meets Cup edge. For last of these dc, work an fdc before the gap, 7fdc, with the seventh st joining into other Cup on the opposite side at the same point, dc up central edge of Top piece, turn.

Row 2 (WS) Ch1, dc in fl to 5 (5: 6: 6: 7: 7) sts before first fdc, making the last of these dc an fdc before the gap. 6fdc, with last of these fdc joining into same point on opposite side, dc in fl to end, turn.

Row 3 Ch1, dc in bl to 5 (5: 6: 6: 7: 7) sts before next fdc, making last of these dc an fdc before the gap. 5fdc, with last of these sts joining into same point on opposite side, dc in bl in each st to end.

Fasten off.

BUST BAND (MAKE 2)

You will rejoin yarn to outer edge of Cup to work on sts at lower edge of Cup. If the last row of the Cup is a WS row, make this next row a RS row and vice versa. For a RS row count 22 (22: 23: 23: 25: 25) sts from lower edge of Cup and join in the last of these sts. For a WS row start at lower edge of Cup and work over the next 22 (22: 23: 23: 25: 25) sts for the first row:

Row 1 Ch1, htr in each st, working a htr2tog over the 2 sts at the upper edge of the Band, turn. [21 (21: 22: 22: 24: 24) sts]

Rep Row 1 until there are 16 (16: 16: 19: 19: 19) sts rem. Now work in rows of htr without shaping until Band measures 35 (40: 45: 50: 55: 60)cm from central join of Cups when stretched, do not fasten off.

Next row Ch1, dc in first st, (ch3, skip 2 sts, dc in next st) 5 (5: 5: 6: 6) times.

[5 (5: 5: 6: 6) lacing loops]

Fasten off.

Repeat for second Bust Band matching number of rows to first side.

TOP EDGING

Rejoin yarn with WS facing and a 3.5mm hook.

Row 1 (WS) Ch1, dc evenly into first top edge piece, cont with same number of dc along top of second piece, turn.

Row 2 (RS) Ch1, dc in each st to end.

Fasten off.

Any slight unevenness in this top edge will be neatened out with blocking.

LOWER EDGING

Rejoin yarn with RS facing and a 3.5mm hook.

Row 1 (RS) Ch1, dc evenly along lower straight edge, working a multiple of 4 + 2 sts, turn.

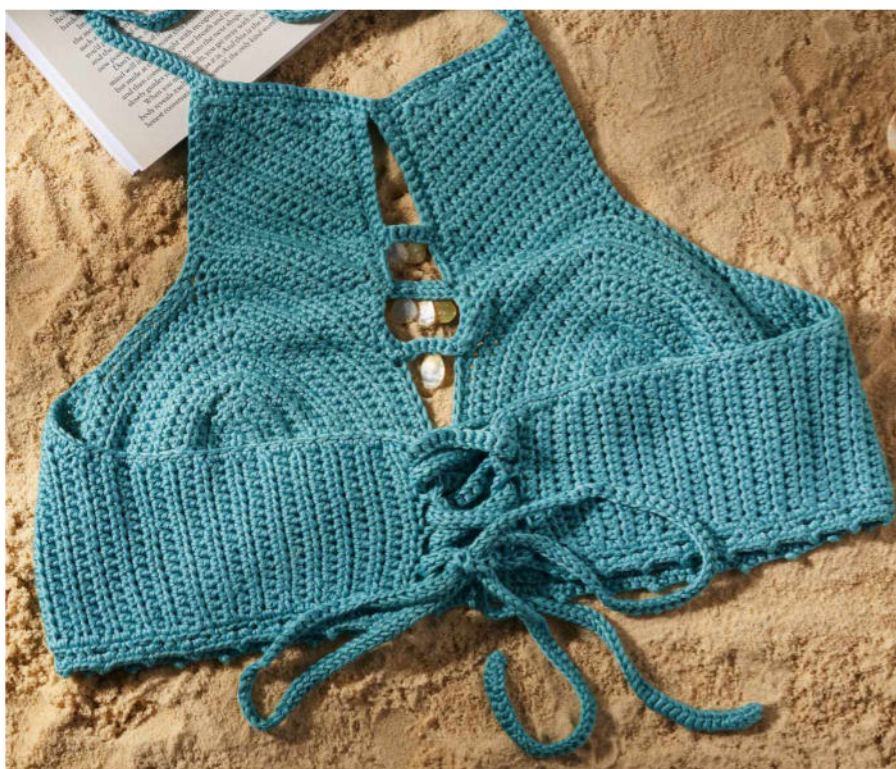
Row 2 Ch1, (dc in next 2 sts, ch2, skip 2 sts) rep to last 2 sts, dc in last 2 sts.

Fasten off.

EDGING AND NECK TIES

With a 3.5mm hook, ch2, fdc in second ch from hook and cont working fdc until length measures 60cm. Make the last of these fdc a stitch after the gap (see Special Abbreviations) to join the length to the upper right corner of the Top. Cont working dc evenly along the edge of the Top, around the Cup and along the top of the Bust Band. When you reach the lacing loops, change to a 3mm hook and work as Row 2 of the Lacing Loops. Cont with a 3mm hook to work along the bottom edge, working *dc in next 2 sts, (dc, ch-2 picot, dc) in ch-2 sp; rep from * to last 2 sts, dc in last 2 sts. Work in the same way in the lacing loops at the other end of the Band, then change back to a 3.5mm hook to dc evenly along the edge to the top of the Halter piece. Make the last of these dc a st before the gap and cont with a length of fdc for the Tie to match the length of the first.

Fasten off and weave the ends into the ties.



BACK TIE

Make a length of fdc as before to measure 140 (140: 140: 160: 160: 160)cm or length required.

Fasten off and weave in all ends.

Block to measurements.

HAT

Everyone needs Marianne Rawlins' easy, breezy hat that can take you from the beach to the café in style

- King Cole Raffia (100% cellulose rayon, 50g/114m), 3 balls of Natural (1456)
- King Cole Bamboo Cotton DK (50% bamboo, 50% cotton, 100g/230m), 1 ball of Dusty Pink (618)
- A 4mm (US G/6) hook

TENSION

Rounds 1-6 of measure 10x10cm (4x4in) over double crochet using a 4mm hook, or size needed to obtain correct tension

MEASUREMENTS

Hat measures 60cm (23¼in) in circumference

NOTES

Hat is worked in rounds with RS facing throughout.

HAT

CROWN

Using Natural, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1 (does not count as st

throughout), 9dc in loop, ss to beg dc. [9 dc]

Round 2 Ch1, 2dc in each st around, ss to beg dc. [18 dc]

Round 3 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next st) 9 times, ss to beg dc. [27 sts]

Round 4 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 2 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc. [36 sts]

Round 5 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 3 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc. [45 sts]

Round 6 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 4 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc. [54 sts]

Round 7 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 5 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc. [63 sts]

Round 8 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 6 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc. [72 sts]

Round 9 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 7 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc. [81 sts]

Round 10 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 8 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc, turn. [90 sts]

Rounds 11-23 (WS) Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc, turn at the end of Round 23. [90 sts]

BRIM

Round 24 (RS) Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 9 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc, turn. [99 sts]

Round 25 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc.

Round 26 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 10 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc, turn. [108 sts]

Round 27 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc.

Round 28 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 11 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc, turn. [117 sts]

Round 29 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc.



Round 30 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 12 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc, turn. [126 sts]

Round 31 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc.

Round 32 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 13 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc, turn. [135 sts]

Round 33 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc.

Round 34 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 14 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc, turn. [144 sts]

Round 35 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc.

Round 36 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 15 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc, turn. [153 sts]

Round 37 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc.

Round 32 Ch1, (2dc in next st, dc in next 16 sts) 9 times, ss to beg dc, turn. [162 sts]

Round 33 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc.

Fasten off.

BAND

Using Dusty Pink, ch3, turn.

Row 1 (RS) Ch1, dc in second ch from hook and next st, turn. [2 dc]

Row 2 (WS) Ch1, 2dc in each st, turn. (4 dc)

Row 3 Ch1, 2dc in first st, dc in next 2 sts, 2dc in

last st, turn. [6 dc]

Row 4 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn. [6 dc]

Row 5 Ch1, 2dc in first st, dc in next 4 sts, 2dc in last st, turn. [8 dc]

Row 6 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in next 4 sts, dc2tog, turn. [6 sts]

Row 7 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn. [6 dc]

Row 8 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in next 2 sts, dc2tog, turn. [4 sts]

Row 9 Ch1, dc2tog twice, turn. [2 sts]

Row 10 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn. [2 dc]

Repeat Rows 2-10, 10 times more.

Fasten off leaving a long tail.

Use long tail to sew short ends of Band together.

BORDER

Rejoin in end of first row to work around the Band, dc2tog over first 2 row-ends, *dc in next row-end, 2dc in each of next 3 row-ends, dc in next row-end, dc2tog over next 2 row-ends twice; repeat from * around, ss to first st to join.

Fasten off.

Repeat along the opposite side of the Band.

ESPADRILLES

Make sure you're in crochet from head to toe with Marianne Rawlins' boho-style granny square espadrilles

- King Cole Raffia (100% cellulose rayon, 114m/50g), 1 ball of Natural (1456)
- King Cole Bamboo Cotton DK (50% bamboo, 50% cotton, 100g/230m), 1 ball of each: Old Gold (625), Sea Breeze (3331), Dusty Pink (618), Denim (619)
- A 4mm (US G/6) hook
- A pair of espadrille soles

TENSION

Rounds 1-3 of Square measures 8x8cm (3¼x3¼in)

MEASUREMENTS

To fit espadrille soles of any size

NOTES

Espadrilles are made up of a Square that sits over the foot. The Square needs to be slightly bigger than half your foot circumference. Sizes are written in *S*, *M* and *L*, but can be adapted to your own measurements.

ESPADRILLES

SQUARES (MAKE 2)

Using Dusty Pink, make a magic loop.

Round 1 Ch3, 2tr into loop, ch2, (3tr into ring, ch2) 3 times, ss to top of beg ch-3. [12 sts]

Join Natural in any ch-2 sp.

Round 2 Ch3, (tr, ch2, 2tr) in same ch-sp, tr in each of next 3 sts, *(2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-sp, tr in each of next 3 sts; repeat from * twice more, ss



to top of beg ch-3 to join. [28 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Sea Breeze in any ch-2 sp

Round 3 Ch3, (tr, ch2, 2tr) in same ch-sp, tr in each of next 7 sts, *(2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-sp, tr in each of next 7 sts; repeat from * twice more, ss to top of beg ch-3 to join. [44 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Natural in any ch-2 sp.

Round 4 Ch3, (tr, ch2, 2tr) in same ch-sp, tr in each of next 11 sts, *(2tr, ch2, 2tr) in ch-sp, tr in each of next 11 sts; repeat from * twice more, ss to top of beg ch-3 to join. [60 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Denim in any ch-2 sp.

Round 5 Ch1 (does not count as st), *(2dc, ch2, 2dc) in ch-sp, dc in each of next 15 sts; repeat from * 3 times more, ss to beg dc. [76 sts]

Fasten off

Join Old Gold in any ch-2 sp.

Round 6 Ch1 (does not count as st), *(2dc, ch2, 2dc) in ch-sp, dc in each of next 19 sts; repeat from * 3 times more, ss to beg dc.

Rep Round 6 until Square measures 9 (10.5: 12) cm, or place around your foot to make sure it can attach comfortably to the soles.

Fasten off.

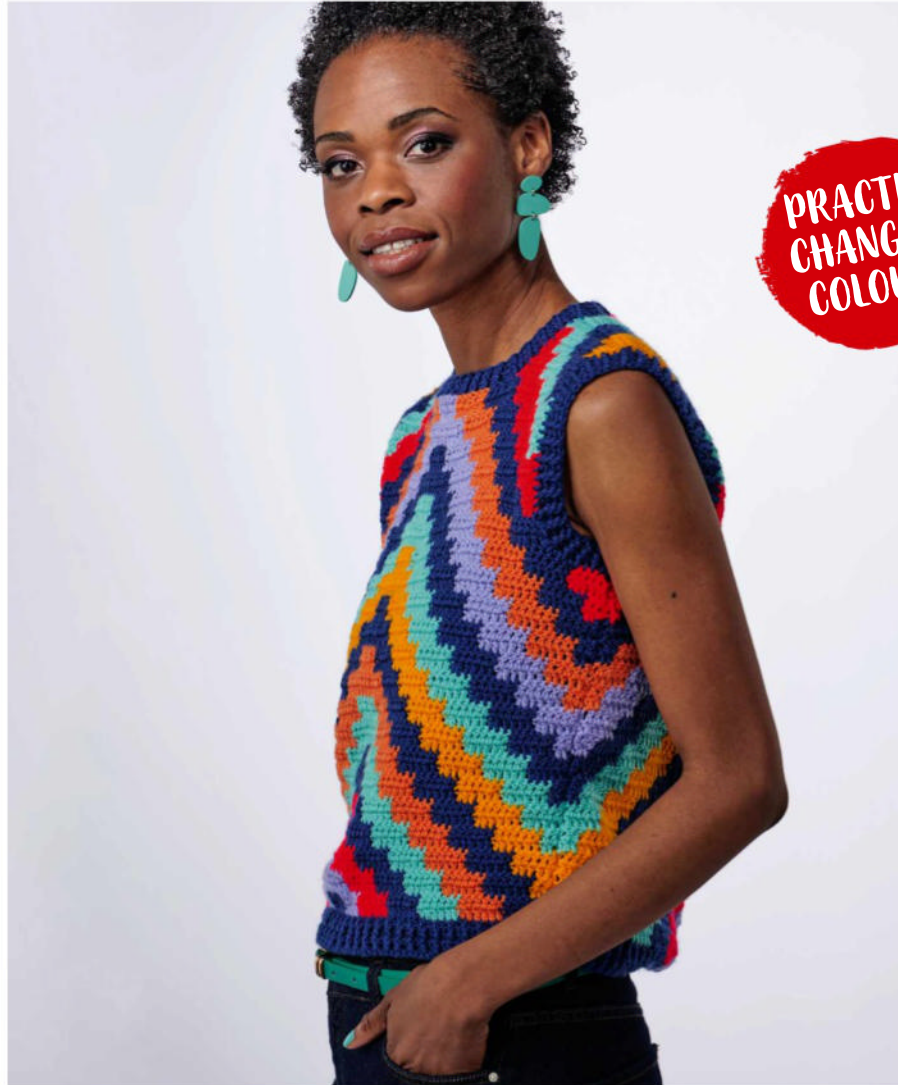

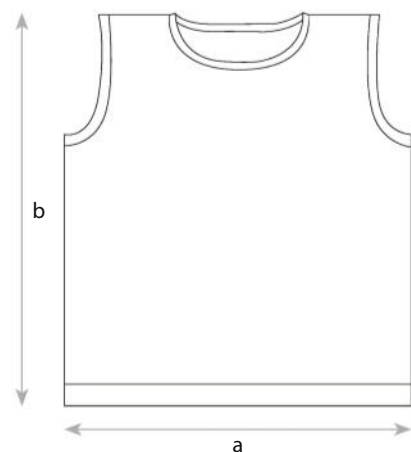

Make a statement with this zingy sleeveless top! If you've never crocheted from a chart before, this is a great pattern to start with.

NOTES

Vest is worked from bottom up in 2 panels. Follow the Chart on page 88 for the colourwork, keeping the pattern correct over the shaping sections. Each square on the Chart represents 3 treble stitches. The Chart is read from the bottom up; right to left on RS rows and left to right on WS rows. Change colour in last yrh of previous stitch. The lines on the Chart indicate the edges of the Chart for the size you are working. The Chart continues up to the armholes at Row 30. Then, continue the colour patt in same fashion. Neck and armhole ribbing is worked onto the Vest once the shoulders and sides are seamed. It helps to leave long tails at the edges so you can use them to seam.

VEST

BACK

LOWER BODY

Using Yarn A, ch80 (92: 98: 110: 116: 128: 134).

Row 1 (RS) Tr in third ch from hook (counts as st) and each ch across, turn.

[78 (90: 96: 108: 114: 126: 132) sts]

Rows 2-4 Ch2 (counts as st), (FPtr around next st, BPptr around next st) rep to last st, FPtr in final st, turn.

Begin working your colours as per the chart.

Rows 1-30 Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), tr in each st across, turn.

Fasten off.

For the following section above the armholes, cont the colour patt in the same fashion. You can refer to the top row of the Chart to see the colour sequence; the colours towards the edges of the Chart are the next colours to be introduced. For all sizes up to L, the colour sequence you need is present in the top row, but for larger sizes, the next 2 colours to be introduced are Spice followed by Aspen.

ARMHOLE SHAPING

Count 9 (9: 12: 11: 12: 14: 16) sts from the outer edge and keeping in colour pattern, join yarn in

Row 1 (RS) Ch3, 59 (71: 71: 85: 89: 97: 99) tr, turn leaving rem sts unworked.

[60 (72: 72: 86: 90: 98: 100) sts]

Row 2 Ch3, tr3tog, tr in each st to last 4 sts, tr3tog, tr in last st, turn.

[68 (68: 82: 86: 94: 96) sts]

Rep last row 2 (2: 4: 5: 7: 6) times more.

[- (60: 60: 66: 66: 66: 72) sts]

ALL SIZES

UPPER BODY

Working in rows of treble without shaping and keeping colour pattern correct, work a further 17 (16: 18: 18: 19: 19: 22) rows. [18 (20: 22: 24: 26: 28: 30) rows from beg of armholes]

FRONT

Work as Back to Upper Body.

UPPER BODY

Working in rows of treble without shaping and keeping colour pattern correct, work a further 11 (10: 12: 12: 13: 13: 16) rows.

TO MAKE UP

Using tails of yarn to match colours, join the side seams.

Using French Navy and with RS facing, join yarn in any st at the back of neckline.

Round 1 (RS) Ch3, working in bl of tr sts, tr in each st and 2tr in each row-end, ss to top of beg ch-3, do not turn.

There should be an even number of sts around the neckline.

Round 2 Ch2 (does not count as st), (FPtr around next st, BPtr around next st) rep around, ss to first FPtr to join, do not turn.

Rounds 3-4 Rep Round 2.

Fasten off.

ARMHOLE EDGING

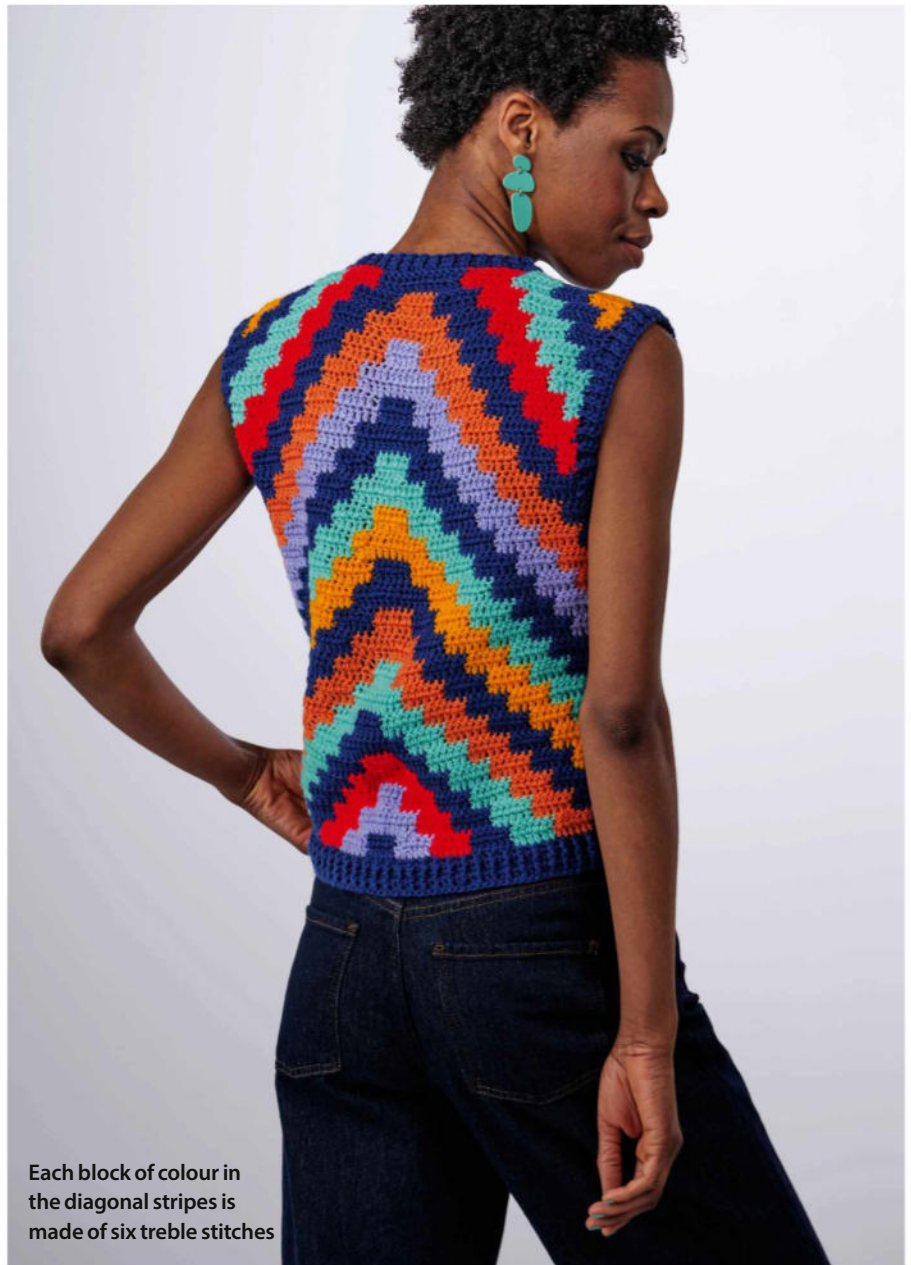
With French Navy and RS facing, join yarn in any st at the base of underarm.

Round 1 Ch3 (counts as st), tr in each underarm st, 2tr in each shaping row-end, tr evenly around rem armhole, approx 6tr to 8 rows.

Ensure there are an even number of sts in total, ss to beg ch-3, do not turn.

Repeat Rounds 2-4 of Armhole Edging.

Weave in all ends.



Each block of colour in the diagonal stripes is made of six treble stitches

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO CHANGE COLOUR IN ROWS



1 Start working the last stitch of the last row of the old colour, but stop before you work the final yrh of the stitch. Cut off the old yarn, leaving a tail about 7cm long.



2 Now loop the new yarn colour around the hook, leaving a long tail of yarn (about 7cm long).



3 Pull the new yarn loop through the remaining 2 loops to finish off the stitch. Pull the old and new yarn ends to tighten the loop on the hook.



4 Now you can work the turning chain of the new row in the new colour (eg, 3ch for treble). Then work the stitches of the new row in the new yarn colour.

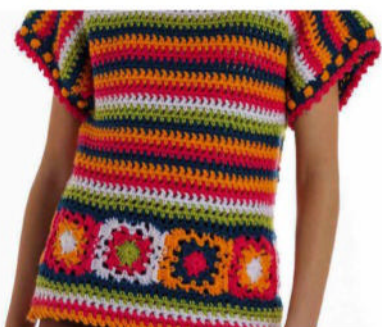

You may find it helpful to place a marker in the first st of each round, moving it up as you go. This item is not suitable as a toy for a child under 36 months due to the inclusion of potentially hazardous parts.

SUNFLOWER CENTRE

Using Mocha, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1 (does not count as a st throughout), 6dc in loop. [6 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around. [12 sts]

Round 3 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 4 (2dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [24 sts]

Round 5 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [30 sts]

Round 6 (4dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [36 sts]

Round 7 (5dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [42 sts]

Rounds 8-9 Dc in each st around.

Insert safety eyes between Rounds 4-5, approx 10 sts apart.

Using light pink, embroider the cheeks.

Using black stranded cotton, embroider the mouth.

Rounds 10-11 Dc in each st around.

Change to Meadow.

Round 12 (5dc, inv dec) 6 times. [36 sts]

Round 13 (4dc, inv dec) 6 times. [30 sts]

Round 14 (3dc, inv dec) 6 times. [24 sts]

Round 15 (2dc, inv dec) 6 times. [18 sts]

Stuff as you work.

Round 16 (1dc, inv dec) 6 times. [12 sts]

Round 17 (Inv dec) 6 times. [6 sts]

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 6 sts and pull tight to close.

PETALS (MAKE 8)

Using Dandelion, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 4dc in loop. [4 sts]

Round 2 2dc in next st, dc in each st around. [5 sts]

Round 3 2dc in each st around. [10 sts]

Round 4 Dc in each st around.

Round 5 (1dc, 2dc in next st) 5 times. [15 sts]

Round 6 (2dc, 2dc in next st) 5 times. [20 sts]

Round 7 (4dc, 2dc in next st) 4 times. [24 sts]

Rounds 8-13 Dc in each st around.

Round 14 (1dc, inv dec) 8 times. [16 sts]

Round 15 (Inv dec) 8 times.

Round 16 (Inv dec) 4 times. [4 sts]

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 4 sts and pull tight to close.



Sew the petals and the stalk to the back of the sunflower's centre, then add the leaves

STEM

Using Meadow, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc in loop. [6 sts]

Round 2 Dc in each st around.

Rep Round 2 until Stem measures length of wooden dowel or chopstick.

Fasten off.

Place a small amount of stuffing into the Stem and insert the wooden dowel, pushing the stuffing to the base.

Sew the top of the Stem closed.

LEAVES (MAKE 2)

Using Meadow, make a magic loop.

Rounds 1-5 (RS) As Rounds 1-5 of Petals.

[15 sts]

Rounds 6-8 Dc in each st around.

Round 9 (Dc in next st, inv dec) 5 times. [10 sts]

Round 10 (Inv dec) 5 times.

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 5 sts and pull tight to close.

TO MAKE UP

Sew the Petals to the Centre, over Rounds 10-11.

Sew the Stem to the back of the Centre.

Sew the Leaves to the Stem.

Weave in any rem ends.

CATHERINE'S JOURNAL

...from the studio

Summer is here, and we're itching to take our hooks outdoors. But is it practical? Catherine Venner of Crochet Cloudberry investigates....



Catherine's projects go outdoors, on day trips and even on holiday

The sun's out, the temperatures are rising and it's light until late – what's not to like? When the British summer comes, we're all in a hurry to get outside and enjoy it... that is, unless you're about to finish a crochet project, or have just spotted a new, beautiful pattern. And so we crocheters are faced with a dilemma: should we go out in the sunshine or sit inside with your hooks and yarn? Or can the two activities be joined together somehow?

CROCHET IN THE GREAT OUTDOORS

I'm a firm believer that crochet should not just be relegated to the sofa on rainy days. Summer offers us an excellent opportunity to take our crochet out into the wild!

I just love sitting in the garden among the blooms, my latest WIP on my lap. Not only am I soaking up some vital vitamin D, but I'm also letting my creative juices flow through my crochet.

Many of my designs are inspired by the flowers and animals in my garden. And sitting and listening to the birds in the trees with a nice drink in one hand and my hook in the other is the perfect way to end a summer's day. If you don't have your own garden, a local park or community garden is also a great place to practise your craft.

Another one of my favourite things to do in the summer is take my crochet on excursions. Wherever we head for a picnic, my current project is always stuffed into the basket alongside the sandwiches and crudités – after all, what could be more relaxing than doing a few rows after a lunch al fresco? It also provides you with some fantastic photo ops – I don't think there is any crochet that doesn't look fabulous against a backdrop of rolling hills or the ocean.

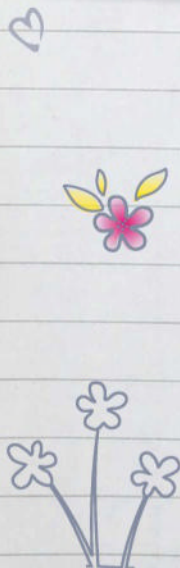
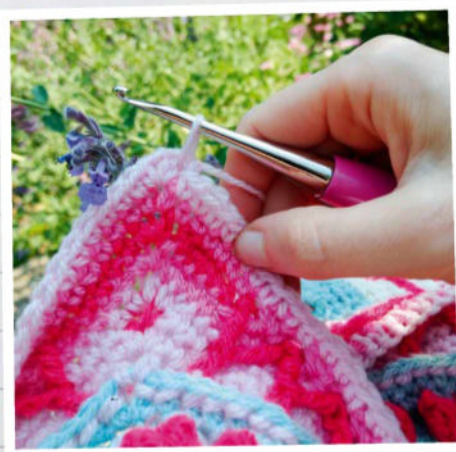
However, day-tripping with crochet does have a few pitfalls. I once decided to take a cardigan project to the beach, not anticipating that the slight breeze would blow the sand into the yarn, where it stuck. The garment needed a good washing before I'd even worn it!

Another time, I took a picture of a blanket on a bush near a stately home. I ended up spending half an hour pulling dead leaves off the back of the throw.

TRAVELLING WIPS

Once you've mastered the art of day trips with WIPs, you're ready to go further and bring your crochet on holiday. As a true crochet addict, I can't remember the last time I stayed over anywhere without at least one ball of yarn in my luggage. (At this point, I must point out that I have

a wonderful partner who tolerates the large bags of yarn that fill our boot when we go on holidays.)

That said, there are times when you just can't take your latest half-made afghan because space won't allow it – for example, when you're flying with limited baggage. But don't be deterred. Small, single skein projects such as hats are your perfect companions on such vacations. But sometimes, taking that big project with you can pay off, too. For instance, I once flew to America with all the yarn needed to make a blanket in my suitcase. Over the 10-day holiday, I crocheted the bed throw, gifted it to my sister's family and bought enough American yarn to refill my case. A win all round!

DON'T FORGET THE SCISSORS!

A little bit of planning is required when crocheting in the wild. Firstly, you need to make sure that you bring the equipment for

your project. I've frequently ended up kicking myself after realising I'd forgotten to pack the scissors. I also tend not to take my favourite ergonomic hooks any further than my garden for fear of losing them. Hooks can easily slip down the gaps in a park bench, so I like to use ones that I can pick up cheaply at local craft stores. And, of course, portability plays a role – if our day out involves a bit of a hike, I'm more likely to take a lightweight project like a doily as opposed to a chunky cardi.

Nowadays, yarncrafts are very present on the street scene, especially thanks to the wonderful yarnbombed post boxes around the country. Crochet in the wild feels like the logical next step. Grab your yarn and hooks and get out there!

Row 2 (WS) Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), dc in each st across, turn. Change to Royal Orange.

Rows 3-4 As Row 2.

Change to Lemon.

Row 5 Ch1, dc2tog, dc in next 8 sts, turn. [9 sts]

Row 6 Ch1, dc in first 5 sts, turn leaving rem sts unworked. [5 sts]

Change to Parrot Green.

Rows 7-8 As Row 2.

Change to Capri Blue.

Row 9 As Row 2.

Row 10 Ch1, skip first st, dc in next 3 sts, ss in final st.

Fasten off.

EDGING

Place 2 pieces together and work next round through both layers to join.

Join Baby Blue in base of Heart.

Round 1 Ss evenly around, working 1 ss in each st and row-end around, ss in beg ss.

Round 2 Ch1, dc in each ss and 2dc in each corner ss around, ss to beg dc.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

Sew a safety pin to the back of the Badge.

RAINBOW BADGE (MAKE 1)

Using Scarlet, ch2.

Row 1 (RS) 2dc in second ch from hook, turn. [2 sts]

Row 2 (WS) Ch1, 2dc in each st across, turn. [4 sts]

Change to Royal Orange.

Row 3 Ch1, (1dc, 2dc in next st) twice, turn. [6 sts]

Row 4 Ch1, (2dc, 2dc in next st) twice, turn. [8 sts]

Change to Lemon.

Row 5 Ch1, (3dc, 2dc in next st) twice, turn. [10 sts]

Row 5 Ch1, (4dc, 2dc in next st) twice, turn. [12 sts]

Change to Parrot Green.

Row 6 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 7 Ch1, dc in first 6 sts, turn leaving rem sts unworked. [6 sts]



The badges are worked in rows of double crochet and finished with a border all around

Rep Rows 1-3 throughout.

SIDE PANEL (MAKE 2)

Using Yarns A and D, ch133 (139: 145: 151: 157: 163: 167: 173: 173).

Row 1 (RS) Tr into fourth ch from hook, tr in next 56 (59: 62: 65: 68: 71: 73: 76: 77) ch, pm in last tr, tr in each ch to end, turn.

[131 (137: 143: 149: 155: 161: 165: 171: 173) sts]

Row 2 (WS) Ch3 (counts as first tr throughout), (FPdtr around next st, tr in next st) rep across to end, turn.

Row 3 Ch3, (FPdtr around next st, tr in next st) rep across to end, turn.

Rep Row 3 in colour sequence until piece measures 25 (27: 30: 32: 35: 37: 40: 42: 45)cm,

ending on a WS row.
Fasten off.

SLEEVE

Join yarn in 29th (29th: 31st: 31st: 33rd: 33rd: 33rd: 33rd) st.

Row 1 (RS) Ch3, (FPdtr around next st, tr in next st) 37 (40: 41: 44: 47: 48: 50: 53: 54) times, turn leaving rem sts unworked.

Row 2 Ch3, (FPdtr around next st, tr in next st) rep across to end, turn.

Rep Row 2 until Sleeve measures 19 (20: 20: 21: 21: 21: 21: 21)cm.

Fasten off.

With RS facing, join Yarns A and D in final st on last row of Sleeve.

Next row Ch1, reverse dc in each st across.

Fasten off.

TO MAKE UP

Fold each Panel in half to form the front, back and sleeve.

Whipstitch the side and sleeve seams.

Place Panels together and whipstitch the back together over 60 (62: 66: 68: 70: 73: 75: 77: 77) sts.

HEM AND FRONT EDGING

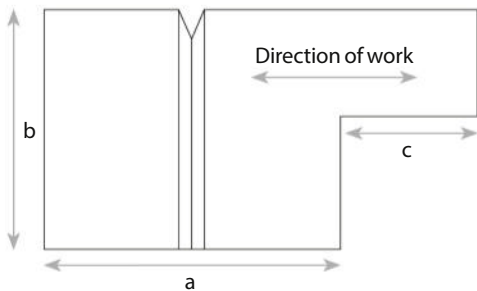
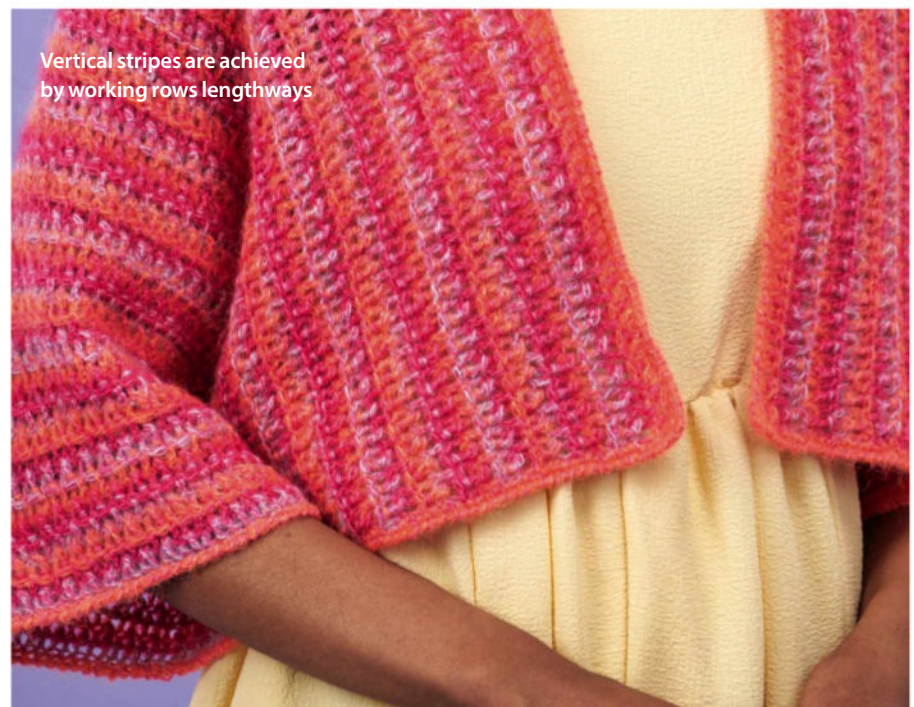
With RS facing, join Yarns A and C at base of left front.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 2dc in each row-end around hem, dc in each st around opening, ss to beg dc, do not turn.

Block to measurements listed.

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 6 sts and pull tight to close.

Round 8 (6dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [48 sts]

Round 9 (7dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [54 sts]

Round 10 (8dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [60 sts]

Rounds 11-25 Dc in each st around.

Stuff as you work.

Round 26 (8dc, inv dec) 6 times. [54 sts]

Round 27 (7dc, inv dec) 6 times. [48 sts]

Round 28 (6dc, inv dec) 6 times. [42 sts]

Round 29 (5dc, inv dec) 6 times. [36 sts]

Round 30 (4dc, inv dec) 6 times. [30 sts]

Round 31 (3dc, inv dec) 6 times. [24 sts]

Round 32 (2dc, inv dec) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 33 (Dc, inv dec) 6 times. [12 sts]

Round 34 (Inv dec) 6 times. [6 sts]

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 6 sts and pull tight to close.

Sew the Head to the Body, topping up with stuffing as you join.

Using Light Grey, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) As Rounds 1-3 of Legs. [18 sts]

Round 4 Dc in bl of each st around.

Rounds 5-6 Dc in each st around.

Change to White.

Rounds 7-9 Dc in each st around.

Change to Yellow.

Round 10 Dc in each st around.

Round 11 (4dc, inv dec) 3 times. [15 sts]

Rounds 12-19 Dc in each st around.

Stuff lower half of Arm lightly.

Round 20 (3dc, inv dec) 3 times. [12 sts]



The ears are made in two hexagonal pieces and sewn together during the final round

Round 21 (Inv dec) 6 times. [6 sts]

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 6 sts and pull tight to close.

Sew the Arms between Rounds 49-50 of the Body.

EARS (MAKE 4)

Each Ear is made up of 2 identical pieces.

Using Light Grey, make a magic loop.

Rounds 1-4 (RS) As Rounds 1-4 of Legs.

[24 sts]

Round 5 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [30 sts]

Round 6 (4dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [36 sts]

Round 7 (5dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [42 sts]

Round 8 (6dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times, ss in next st. [48 sts]

Fasten off.

Place 2 pieces together with RS facing out and lining up the increases to achieve the hexagon shape. Work the next round through both pieces to join.

Join yarn in first st.

Round 9 Ch1, (dc in next 7 sts, picot, dc in next

st) 6 times, ss to beg dc.

Fasten off.

Sew Ears between Rounds 15-23 of the Head.

TRUNK

Using Light Grey, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc in loop. [6 sts]

Round 2 (Dc, 2dc in next st) 3 times. [9 sts]

Round 3 (2dc, 2dc in next st) 3 times. [12 sts]

Round 4 Dc in each st around.

Round 5 (2dc, inv dec) 3 times. [9 sts]

Round 6 (2dc, 2dc in next st) 3 times. [12 sts]

Rounds 7-21 Dc in each st around.

Fasten off.

Flatten the final round and use the tail to sew closed.

Sew the Trunk between Rounds 16-17 of the Head.

TUSKS (MAKE 2)

Using White, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 4dc in loop. [4 sts]

Round 2 Dc in each st around.

Round 3 (Dc, 2dc in next st) twice. [6 sts]

Rounds 4-6 Dc in each st around.

Fasten off.

Flatten the final round and use the tail to sew closed.

Sew the Tusks either side of the Trunk, over Rounds 18 of the Head.

HAT

Using Pink, make a magic loop.

Rounds 1-4 (RS) As Rounds 1-4 of Legs. [24 sts]

Round 5 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [30 sts]

Round 6 Dc in bl of each st around.

Round 7 (3dc, inv dec) 6 times. [24 sts]

Round 8-9 Dc in each st around.

Round 10 (Working in bl throughout) (Dc, 2dc in next st) 12 times. [36 sts]

Round 11 (2dc, 2dc in next st) 12 times. [48 sts]

Round 12 (3dc, 2dc in next st) 12 times. [60 sts]

Round 13 (4dc, 2dc in next st) 12 times. [72 sts]

Fasten off.

Using a single strand of white stranded cotton, sew the Hat to the Head over Rounds 3-11.

BELT

Using White, make a ch to the measurements of Round 32 of the Body.

Fasten off.

Sew around Round 32 of the Body.

BELT BUTTON

Using Pink, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 6dc in a loop. [6 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around, ss to beg dc. [12 sts]

Fasten off.

Sew to the Belt.

TAIL (OPTIONAL)

Using Light Grey, ch14.

Fasten off.

Sew to the back of the Body between Rounds 21-22.

Using a darning needle, separate the strand of yarn at the end of the tail and trim to desired length.

TAIL BOW (OPTIONAL)

Using Pink, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) (Ch2, tr in loop, ch2, ss in the loop) twice.

Fasten off.

Thread one tail around the centre to form the bow shape.

Sew the Bow to the end of the Tail.

Fasten off.

TO FINISH

Using black stranded cotton, embroider the eyes between Rounds 13-15, 13 sts apart.

Using black stranded cotton, embroider the mouth under the Tusks.

Weave in all ends.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO WORK AN INVISIBLE DECREASE (INVDEC)



1 Work up to where you want the decrease to be placed. The next 2 stitches will be decreased to 1 stitch.



2 Insert the hook through the front loop on the next stitch, then insert hook through the front loop on the second stitch.



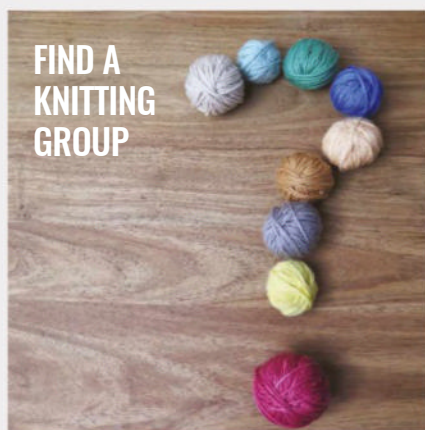

Australian designer Sandra Torrance's signature style features autumnal colours and textured bobbles

STITCHED STRONG

After a devastating diagnosis, Sandra Torrance of Little Golden Nook discovered a passion for crochet design thanks to her family's support, her faith and her own inner strength

The world of Little Golden Nook feels idyllic, cosy and full of love. Children play outdoors in bobbly jumpers, squishy blankets and chunky jumpers hang in inviting neutral interiors and tanned, blonde-haired designer Sandra Torrance crochets with a smile on her face, wearing several of her own gorgeous creations. The beauty of Sandra's world is real – she really has a loving family, a creatively inspiring home and a love of outdoor stitching – but it's only part of her story.

Sandra has Chronic Fatigue Syndrome, or ME/CFS, which causes extreme tiredness and inflammation – and completely changed the direction of the former physical education teacher's life. But thanks to the love of her family, her unwavering Christian faith and her own strength and

optimism, Sandra found happiness by focusing not on what she can't do but on what she can – and one of the things she can do, and do very well, is crochet.

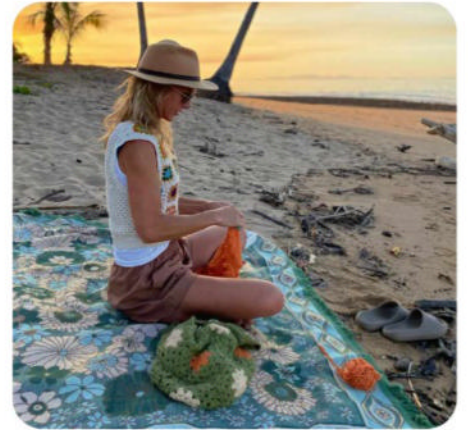
WEATHER THE STORM

"I was studying my final year of phys ed teaching, training as a distance runner and working various casual jobs when I first became unwell with a virus," Sandra explains. "I'd never been prone to illness, and never had a reason to stop and rest. I pushed through to begin teaching, but my health gradually got worse with the extra exertion needed to get through each day. I was eventually diagnosed with ME/CFS, which I've now had for 20 years. It was like hitting a brick wall and being forced to face a complete life change, and I struggled hard to accept it for at least another year."

However, with the whole-hearted support of her partner, she began to "embrace [my pain] as an opportunity rather than a failure". And her faith granted her tranquillity – without it, she says, "I don't think I'd have had the peace of mind to have built my own beautiful creative nook or tiny space in this world, let alone recover from having three babies!"

DISCOVERING CROCHET

Sandra's passion for crochet came later – about ten years ago, after her first two children were born. She had always been creative, and "naturally appreciated handmade knits and blankets, as my mum had always knitted and sewn." She decided to learn crochet in order to make her own cushion covers and dolls' clothes. "I made a granny square cushion cover, and I still



have it, which is amazing, really, as I remember I would fasten off each colour and cut the shortest tail, not realising I needed enough to weave in my ends."

Her crochet design career came about later, after another challenging time in her life. "It was after our 'bonus baby' boy was born seven years ago, followed by some post-natal depression, that I found a new strength, creative drive and perseverance. I sort of 'fell into' the design process by chance. I saw a knitted jumper I loved, and decided to try to crochet a similar style. It worked, and my little Instagram community loved it and asked for a pattern, and off I went, learning the hard way how to write, test and publish a crochet pattern."

Also without meaning to, Sandra stumbled upon her own signature style – modern yet cosy and covered in autumnal colours and lots of bobble stitches! "I do love texture, and bobble stitch will always be my favourite," she says. "My 'bobbly' patterns still outnumber all the others." Eventually, she was not only designing for her own Ravelry and LoveCrafts shops, but in partnership with both local Australian and international yarn companies and for magazines such as *Mollie Makes*.

Even Sandra's children are involved in the crochet side of her life now. "They join in sometimes, as they can all crochet, despite the age gap with a now-17, 15 and seven-year-old," she says. "They're all really supportive, actually, and are moderately impressed with my Instagram following."

And, perhaps most importantly, Sandra continues to get a lot of joy from her crochet work. "I love to crochet on a picnic rug at or near the beach," she says. "If I have my hooks and yarn, always water, usually snacks, I'm happy. If my husband, son and our dog are playing in the distance, even better."

TRUE RESILIENCE

ME/CFS still makes work challenging, but Sandra seems to take the ups and downs of the syndrome in her stride. "I do have periods where I'm too weak to crochet, and I prefer to sit in bed and work so I can easily lean back or lay and rest my eyes when needed," she explains. "But there are other times where I just love to sit outside and

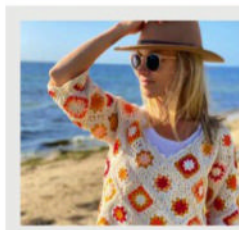
crochet while the energy lasts. I've also been through weeks at a time where upper body inflammation has meant resting my hooks. But in general, crochet has given me purpose, something to be busy with while resting my mind and body and often missing out on social things."

That positive, roll-with-the-punches attitude seems to extend to Sandra's design philosophy, too. "Disasters have never gotten the better of me," she says of her crochet – though she could easily be talking about any area of her life. "I've done all sorts of crazy things to rectify a disaster, things I would never recommend, but I do have a knack for fixing problems without starting again. Every mistake is a chance to learn, and every new challenge has expanded my knowledge and capacity."

For the future, Sandra is looking forward to finishing her backlog of patterns, collaborating with UK companies and starting a premium service for her followers. "And, overall, [I aim to] keep on inspiring others creatively, and with joy and courage."

Whether you use it for picnics or for snoozing on the sofa, this throw will tick all the boxes.

NOTES

Pattern is written in 2 sizes: S and L. The Blanket pictured is made in the Large pattern. The main section is worked in rows using the tapestry technique. Change colour on the final yrh of stitch before colour change is indicated. Carry unused colour across the top of stitches, enclosing the strand as you work. Edging is worked in rows along each side of the Blanket at the end.

BLANKET

Using Weekend Onesie, ch153 (201).

Row 1 Dc in second ch from hook, dc in next 7 sts, *change to Egg Nog, dc in next 8 sts, change to Weekend Onesie, dc in next 8 sts; rep from * 8 (11) times more, turn.

[152 (200) sts]

Row 2 Ch1, dc in next 8 sts, *change to Egg Nog, dc in next 8 sts, change to Weekend Onesie, dc in next 8 sts; rep from * 1 to end, turn.

Rows 3-8 As Row 2.

Fasten off Egg Nog.

Join Bobble Hat in first st.

Row 9 Ch1, dc in next 8 sts, *change to Weekend Onesie, dc in next 8 sts, change to Bobble Hat, dc in next 8 sts; rep from * to end, turn.

Rows 10-16 As Row 9.

Fasten off Bobble Hat.

Join Egg Nog in first st.

Rows 17-24 As Row 2.

Rep Rows 9-24 until 200 (248) rows have been worked in total.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

EDGING

Join Egg Nog to bottom-right corner and work along right edge of Blanket.

Row 1 (RS) Ch1, dc in each row-end, turn. [200 (248) sts]

Row 2 Ch1, htr in each st across, turn.

Rows 3-5 Ch1, (FPptr around next st, BPptr around next st), rep across to end, turn.

Fasten off.

Rep Edging on the opposite side of the Blanket. Join Egg Nog in top-right corner (into row-end of right Edging).

Row 1 (RS) Ch1, 5dc across Edging, dc in each st across, top, 5dc in left edging, turn. [162 (210) sts]

Rows 2-5 As Rows 2-5 of Edging.

Fasten off.

Rep across bottom edge of Blanket.

Weave in all ends.

SAVE OR SPLURGE

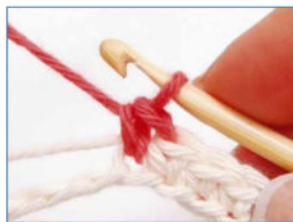
For a more budget-friendly make, try Stylecraft Life: 4 (6) balls of Mint (2342), 3 (5) balls of Daffodil (2394), 3 (2) balls of Ice Blue (2414). Check hook size, tension and ball length if you use a different yarn.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO WORK TAPESTRY COLOURWORK



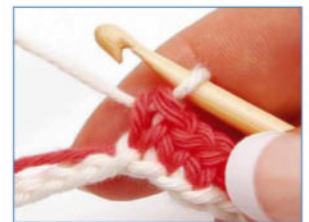
1 Work to the point where you want to change colour and on the last stitch in the first colour, work the final yrh using the second colour.



2 Work a stitch using the second colour, but hold the working end of the first colour on top of the stitches below and make sure you work the new stitch over the top of it, effectively encasing the first colour.



3 Continue working in this way, encasing the working end of the first colour. When you want to change colour again, use the same method as before: on the last stitch in the second colour, work the final yrh using the first colour.



4 It's important not to pull too tightly on the previous colour of yarn or it will pucker the fabric. Continue to work stitches using the first colour, over the top of the working end of the second colour.

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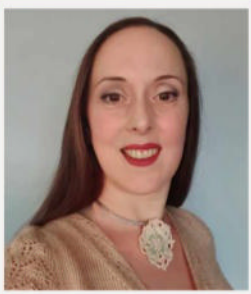

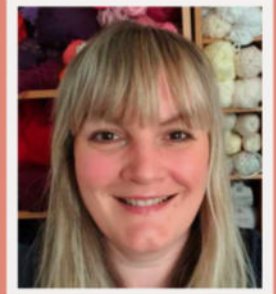

NOTES

Shawl is worked in rows from the bottom up.

A simple chain edging is added along the sides and a provide a decorative chain and picot edging. There is a Stitch Diagram on page 89, which you can refer to. Read all RS rows from right to left and WS from left to right. Rows 6-7 are repeated to end.

Chains are included in the stitch counts throughout.

SHELLS ON THE BEACH

Ch2.

Row 1 (WS) Dc in second ch from hook, turn. [1 st]

Row 2 (RS) Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), 6tr in dc, turn. [7 sts]

Row 3 Ch8 (counts as tr, ch5), dc in fourth tr of 7-tr group, ch5, tr in last st, turn. [13 sts]

Row 4 Ch3, 5tr in st at base of ch-3, dc in third ch of next ch-5 sp, ch5, dc in third ch of next ch-5 sp, 6tr in last st, turn. [19 sts]

Row 5 Ch8 (counts as tr, ch5), skip 2 sts, dc in next st, ch5, dc in third ch of next ch-5, ch5, 3 sts, dc in next st, ch5, tr in final st, turn. [25 sts]

Row 6 Ch3, 5tr in st at base of ch-3, *dc in third ch of next ch-5 sp, ch5, dc in third ch of next ch-5 sp, 5tr in next dc; rep from * to final 2

ch-sps, dc in third ch of next ch-5, ch5, dc in third ch of next ch-5, 6tr in last st in prev row, turn. [31 sts]

Row 7 Ch8 (counts as tr, ch5), skip 2 sts, dc in next st, *ch5, dc in third ch of next ch-5 sp, ch5, dc in third tr of next 5-tr group; rep from * to final st, ch5, tr in final st, turn. [37 sts]

Rows 8-62 Rep Rows 6-7 until Shawl measures approx 150cm wide, ending on a Row 6 rep. Do not fasten off.

EDGING

Round 1 (WS) Ch5, skip 2 sts, dc in fnext st, (ch3, dc in third ch of next ch-5 sp, ch3, skip 2 sts, dc in next tr) rep to end, ch2, tr in final st, ch1, turn to work down row-end edge, picot, ch2, *dc in side of next row, ch3, picot, ch3**; rep from * to last row of side, dc in final row, ch4, (dc, ch3, picot, ch3, dc) in base of Row 1, ch4; rep from * to ** to end of round, ss to third ch of beg ch-5.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

TO FINISH

For best results, block to measurements listed.

Row 1 (RS) Tr in third ch from hook, tr in next 8 ch, *(ch1, skip 1 ch, tr in next ch) 5 times, tr in next 14 ch; rep from * once more, (ch1, skip 1 ch, tr in next ch) 3 times, turn. [50 sts, 13 ch-1 sps]

Row 2 (WS) Ch2 (does not count as st throughout), tr in first 6 sts, *ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 13 sts, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 9 sts; rep from * once more, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 8 sts, turn. [58 sts, 5 ch-1 sps]

Row 3 Ch2, tr in first 7 sts, *ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 11 sts; rep from * 3 times more, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 7 sts, turn.

Row 4 Ch2, tr in next 8 sts, *ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 9 sts, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 13 sts; rep from * once more, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 6 sts, turn.

Row 5 Ch2, (tr in next st, ch1, skip 1 st) 3 times, tr in next 15 sts, (ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next st) 5 times, tr in next 14 sts, (ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next st) 5 times, tr in next 8 sts, turn.

[50 sts, 13 ch-1 sps]

Row 6 Ch2, tr in next 8 sts, *ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 9 sts, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 13 sts; rep from * once more, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 6 sts, turn. [58 sts, 5 ch-1 sps]

Row 7 Ch2, tr in next 7 sts, *ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 11 sts; rep from * 3 times more, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 7 sts, turn.

Row 8 Ch2, tr in next 6 sts, *ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 13 sts, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 9 sts; rep from * once, ch1, skip 1 st, tr in next 8 sts, turn.

Row 9 Ch2, tr in next 9 sts, *(ch1, skip 1 st, 1tr) 5 times, tr in next 14 sts; rep from * once, (ch1, skip st, 1tr) 3 times, turn. [50 sts, 13 ch-1 sps]

Rows 10-96 Rep rows 2-9 another 11 times, on the final repeat ending with a Row 8 rep.

Fasten off.

For best results, block to measurements listed.

TO FINISH

Twist the rectangle twice to form the shape. With WS facing, ss the 2 short ends together.

Fasten off and weave in all ends.

Where do you find your joy? Is it in a beautiful sunset, a hug from a loved one or a favourite song? Celebrate the moments that bring you happiness with a blanket made of beautifully detailed rectangle motifs. The pattern is spread over six issues. Crochet along with us!

NOTES

CAL consists of six parts.

The Blanket is constructed by combining Rectangles that are joined together to form long panels. Panels are separated by sections worked in rows.

The 5mm hook is only used in Part 3; the remainder is worked using a 4.5mm hook. Change colour on the final yrh of st before colour change is indicated. If using 2 colours in one row, carry unused colour across the top of the sts, enclosing the strand as you work. We recommend blocking the Rectangles to the measurements listed before joining. When joining the Rectangles together, you can use either Yellow or Mustard.

BLANKET

PART 4

SHELL STRIP

Rows are worked across the top of Part 3.

Using a 4.5mm hook, join Yellow in top-right corner of Moments Rectangle.

Row 1 (RS) Ch1 (does not counts as st throughout), dc in same corner ch-sp, dc in next 59 sts, dc in next 2 ch-sps, dc in next 21 sts, dc in next 2 ch-sps, dc in next 59 sts, dc in final ch-sp, turn. [145 sts]

Row 2 (WS) Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), tr in each st across, turn.

Row 3 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn. Change to Red.

Row 4 Ch1, dc in first st, (skip 2 sts, 5tr in next st, skip 2 sts, dc in next st) 24 times, , turn. [24 shells]

Change to Yellow.

Row 5 Ch3, *tr in bl of next st, htr in bl of next st, dc in bl of next st, htr in bl of next st, tr in bl of next st, dtr in st 2 rows below (st at base of dc), skip dc; rep from * across to final st, tr in final st, turn. [145 sts]

Row 6 Ch1, dc in each st across, do not turn. Place live loop of Yellow on a stitch marker. Join Orchid in first st from Row 6.

Row 7 (WS) As Row 4.

Place live loop of Yellow back on hook.

Rows 8-9 As Rows 5-6.

Place live loop of Yellow on a stitch marker.

Join Pearl Pink in first st from Row 9.

Row 10 (WS) As Row 4.

Place live loop of Yellow back on hook.

Rows 11-12 As Rows 5-6.

Change to Light Mint.

Row 13 Ch4 (counts as dtr), dtr in next st, *tr in next 2 sts, htr in next st, dc in next 3 sts, htr in next st, tr in next 2 sts, dtr in next 3 sts; rep from

* 11 times more omitting final st on last rep, turn.

Row 14 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn. Change to Cobalt Blue.

Row 15 Ch1, dc in first 2 sts, *htr in next 2 sts, tr in next st, dtr in next 3 sts, tr in next st, htr in next 2 sts, dc in next 3 sts; rep from * 11 times more omitting final st on last rep, turn.

Row 16 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn. Change to Light Blue.

Rows 17-20 Repeat Rows 13-16. Change to Yellow.

Row 21 Ch3, tr in each st across.

Fasten off.

COFFEE AND CAKE RECTANGLE (MAKE 2)

Using a 4.5mm hook and Cobalt Blue, ch29.

Row 1 (RS) Tr in fourth ch from hook, tr in each ch to end, turn. [27 sts]

Rows 2-4 Ch3, tr in each st across, turn.

Change to Light Blue.

Row 5 Ch2 (counts as htr throughout), BPTr around next 2 sts, change to Yellow, *3FPTr around each of next 3 sts, change to Light Blue**, BPTr around next 6 sts, change to Yellow; rep from * twice more ending final rep at **, BPTr around next 2 sts, htr in final st, turn. [45 sts]

Row 6 Ch2, FPTr around next 2 sts, change to Yellow, *BPTr around next 9 sts, change to Light Blue**, FPTr around next 6 sts, change to Yellow; rep from * twice more ending final rep at **, FPTr around next 2 sts, htr in final st, turn. [45 sts]

Row 7 Ch2, BPTr around next 2 sts, change to Yellow, *(BPTr3tog) 3 times, change to Light Blue **, BPTr around next 6 sts, change to Yellow; rep from * twice more ending final rep at **, BPTr around next 2 sts, htr in final st, do not turn. [27 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Light Blue in first st from Row 7.

Row 8 (RS) Ch1, dc in first 4 sts, *change to Red, bobble in fifth BPTr from 9-BPTr group from Row 6, skip 1 st on current row**, dc in next 8 sts; rep from * twice more ending final rep at **, dc in next 4 sts, turn. [27 sts]

Row 9 (WS) Ch3, tr in each st across, turn.

Change to Cobalt Blue.

Rows 10-12 Ch3, tr in each st across.

Fasten off.

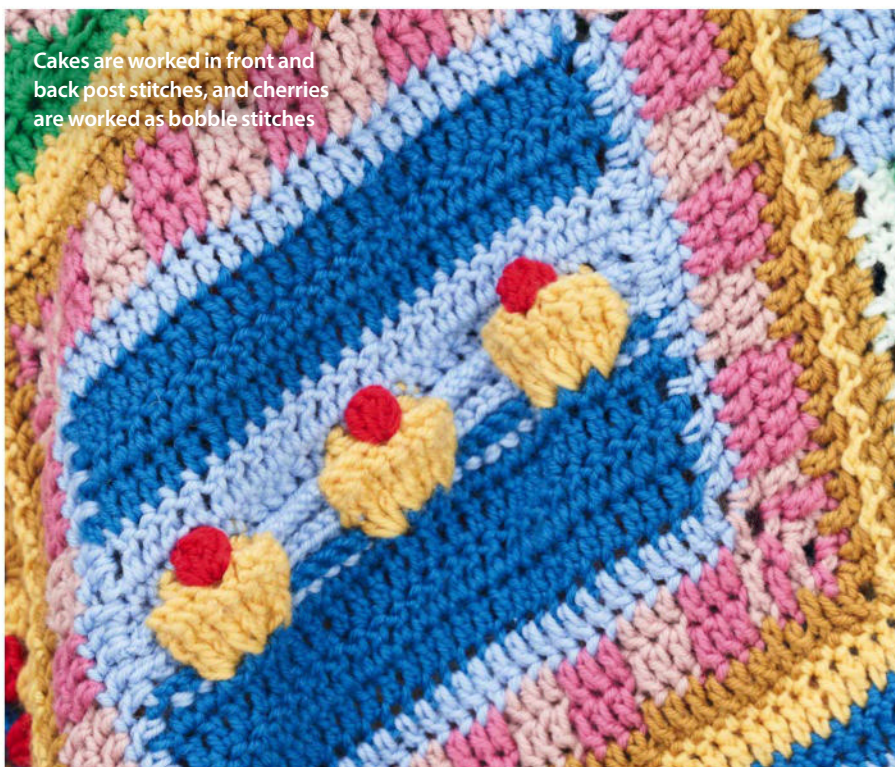
BORDER

Using a 4.5mm hook, join Light Blue in first st from Row 12.

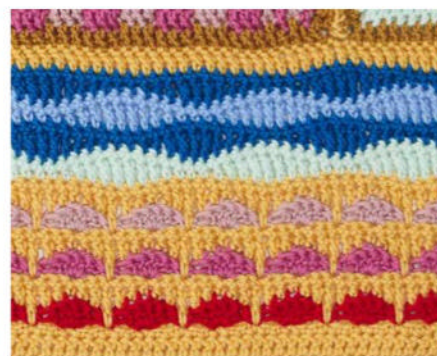
Round 1 (RS) Ch3, tr in each st across to end, ch2, 17tr down row-end edge, ch2, tr in each st across bottom edge, ch2, 17tr down row-end edge, ch2, ss to top of beg ch-3. [88 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

For Rounds 2-5, do not fasten off the yarn when changing colour. Pull the yarn through the loop

Work the shell strip directly from the Moments rectangle from part 3 of the CAL

to close the round and leave the strand on the WS of the work ready to pick up again when instructed.

Join Pearl Pink in top-right ch-2 sp.

Round 2 Ch5 (counts as tr, ch2 throughout), tr in same ch-sp, *(ch4, skip 3 sts, tr in next 3 sts) 4 times, ch4, skip final 3 sts, (tr, ch2, tr) in corner ch-sp, ch5, skip 4 sts, tr in next 3 sts, ch4, skip 3 sts, tr in next 3 sts, ch5, skip 4 sts**, (tr, ch2, tr) in ch-sp; rep from * to **, ss to third ch of beg ch-5. [44 sts, 4 ch-2 corner sps, 12 ch-4 sps, 4 ch-5 sps] On Rounds 3-5, work sts in front of the ch-sps across the sides.

Join Orchid in bottom-left ch-sp and work into the skipped sts from Round 1.

Round 3 Ch1, *(dc, ch2, dc) in corner ch-sp, ch2, skip 1 st, (tr in next 3 sts, ch4, skip 3 sts) 4 times, tr in next 3 sts, ch2, skip final st of side, (dc, ch2, dc) in corner ch-sp, ch2, skip 1 st, tr in next 4 sts, ch4, skip 3 sts, tr in next 3 sts, ch4, skip 3 sts, tr in next 4 sts, ch2, skip final st of side; rep from * once more, ss to beg dc. [60 sts, 12 ch-2 sps, 12 ch-4 sps]

Join Pearl Pink in top-right corner ch-sp.

Round 4 Ch5, tr in same corner ch-sp, *ch2, skip 1 st, tr in skipped st in Round 2, (ch4, skip 3 sts, tr in next 3 sts) 4 times, ch4, skip 3 sts, tr in next skipped st in Round 2, ch2, skip final st of side, (tr, ch2, tr) in corner ch-sp, ch2, skip 1 st, tr in skipped st in Round 2, ch5, skip 4 sts, tr in next 3 sts, ch4, skip 3 sts, tr in next 3 sts, ch5, skip 4 sts, tr in next skipped st in Round 2, ch2, skip final st of side**, (tr, ch2, tr) in corner ch-sp; rep from * to ** once more, ss to third ch of beginning ch-5. [52 sts, 12 ch-2 sps, 12 ch-4 sps, 4 ch-5 sps]

Join Orchid in corner ch-sp.

Round 5 Ch1 (does not count as st), *(dc, ch2, dc) in corner ch-sp, ch2, skip 1 st, tr in skipped st in Round 3, ch2, skip 1 st, (tr in next 3 sts, ch4, skip 3 sts) 4 times, tr in next 3 sts, ch2, skip 1 st, tr in skipped st in Round 3, ch2, skip 1 st, (dc, ch2, dc) in corner ch-sp, ch2, skip 1 st, tr in skipped st in Round 3, ch2, skip 1 st, tr in next 4 sts, ch4, skip 3 sts, tr in next 3 sts, ch4, skip 3 sts, tr in next 4 sts, ch2, skip 1 st, tr in skipped st in Round 3, ch2, skip 1 st; rep from * once more, ss to beg dc. [68 sts, 20 ch-2 sps, 12 ch-4 sps]

Fasten off.

Join Mustard in top-right corner.

Round 6 Ch5, tr in same corner ch-sp, *(tr in next st, tr in skipped st in Round 4) twice, (tr in next 3 sts, tr in next 3 skipped sts in Round 4) 4 times, tr in next 3 sts, (tr in skipped st in Round 4, tr in next st) twice, (tr, ch2, tr) in corner ch-sp, (tr in next st, tr in skipped st in Round 4) twice, tr in next 4 sts, tr in next 3 skipped sts in Round 4, tr in next 3 sts, tr in next 3 skipped sts in Round 4, tr in next 4 sts, (tr in skipped st in Round 4, tr in next st) twice**, (tr, ch2, tr) in corner ch-sp; rep from * to ** once more, ss to third ch of beginning ch-5. [128 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

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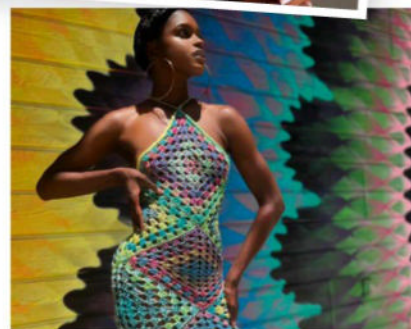




Figure-hugging fashion is taking the crochet world by storm. Handmade is hot!

Bodycon bonanza!

Handmade can be bold and youthful too! As the temperature rises, so does the popularity of form-fitting, on-trend crochet outfits. Let's meet the makers...

We saw a lot of strappy, figure-hugging crochet clothing hit the high street last year, and it looks like the trend is more than just a summer romance. With high-end fashion houses featuring alluring crochet on the catwalks, as well as a new wave of indie designers releasing more form-fitting designs, a new contemporary edge has arrived as an alternative to looser silhouettes. We chatted to four designers about why crochet is trending for another season in the sun...

YOUNG AND BEAUTIFUL

"In a world of fast fashion, I think people really want to see sustainable art again," says Jessica, the designer behind The Stitch Snitch on Etsy, which sells patterns for flirty mini-skirts, form-fitting dresses and halter tops. "Many crocheters, like myself, learned to crochet during the pandemic, and we're injecting modern fashion trends into the age-old tradition, embracing a more contemporary approach to the craft."

To engage younger, more fashion-conscious audiences and keep the tradition of crochet alive, Jessica sees an exciting evolution taking place, with many becoming curious about what pairing figure-hugging silhouettes with beautiful crochet stitch combinations can create.

Handcrafted clothing has become notably more popular since the pandemic, a time when people embraced learning new skills. And with this vanguard of crocheters comes a fresh perspective, with form-fitting designs and unconventional patterns and colours emerging as new trends. "These designs serve as a valuable form of self-expression and individuality for younger crocheters – myself included," says Nicole of The Crocheting, whose designs include not only slinky dresses and twin sets but also saucy filet stitch cutouts, quirky appliqué and unexpected silhouettes. "I can't wait to see more of how each crocheter challenges the status quo," she says.

"My customers who are drawn to bolder, more form-fitting designs are typically younger women who are looking to design an exciting, eye-catching wardrobe," Nicole explains. "I often hear that my designs are a favourite because they're unlike anything else out there – and that speaks volumes to me." When thinking about her pieces, Nicole designs for the audience that is looking to break out from the crowd and embrace what makes them unique.

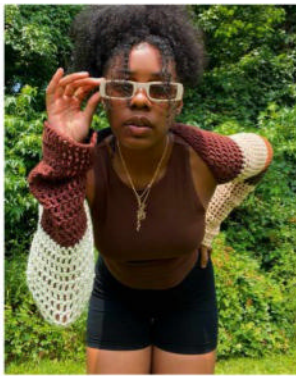
Sierra Ndagire's brand, Crolage, has gained huge popularity over the past few years, due to her innovative designs that are made to celebrate women's bodies. Full of custom

and ready-to-wear pieces that hug curves and stand out from the crowd, Crolage was thrown into the international spotlight when Love Island host Maya Jama wore a piece from Sierra's collection on the ITV dating show. "I think bodycon clothing had become quite repetitive and giving it texture is what crochet does," says Sierra. "With crochet you can [take] thread that isn't stretchy at all and give it whatever level of stretch you desire. That versatility makes it such a great medium, and I personally think there's no rules with it."

HOW TO DO IT

When it comes to the technical side of making a figure-hugging item from yarn, each designer follows their own process. "To get a bodycon-style crochet piece, the tighter the stitch, the snuggier it will be, so I like to opt for a slip stitch or single crochet stitch [a double crochet stitch in the UK]," explains Nicole. However, the designer has learned that sizing is critical to get the perfect fit without the garment becoming too tight or too loose, so the very first thing Nicole does is to create the perfect gauge – tension truly matters here!

Jessica recommends stitches that are easy to increase and decrease, as these techniques give bodycon styles their signature shape. "It's possible to translate boxy stitch combinations into bodycon crochet as well,

but this may require more crochet experience," says Jessica.

SPREADING POSITIVITY

The bodycon trend is also tied to the body positive trend, and sees designers creating beguiling outfits for every size and shape.

"Unlike conventional clothing sold in stores, crochet clothing can be made to your exact measurements," explains Jade Ann Gibbs, the designer behind AnnsClst, a site filled with ready-made and patterns for crochet crop tops and bikinis. "You can create items that flatter your body in the best ways."

Sierra agrees. When designing her bodycon crochet pieces, she says her main goal is to empower her buyer, no matter what shape or size, age or gender they are. "I want people to feel confident," she says.

And Jessica's crochet patterns cater to sizes XS-6XL, which means even people who don't fit into high-street clothes can enjoy making and wearing modern, close-fitting and stretchy styles in their size. "I've had feedback like, 'I never thought I could wear this' and 'I'm glad I stepped outside of my comfort zone' from crocheters who have historically taken a cosier approach to crochet," says Jessica.

"But the cool thing is, there are no rules to fashion. Wear what makes you feel good!"

ELEVATED STYLE

Once synonymous with festivals, beach cover-ups and the like, crochet has been adopted by high-end designers, including The Row and Marine Serre, elevating it from hobby craft to chic and modern. Crochet garments are now worn for every occasion, from beach trips to nights out. "These pieces naturally stand out because they're handmade, one-of-a-kind pieces, and when paired with bodycon silhouettes, that we normally see outside of crochet, the combination is truly stunning," says Jessica.

The designers' love for own their designs also gives them a better understanding of their customers' wants and needs. "When I wear one of my pieces, I feel confident because I'm designing what makes me feel most like 'me'," explains Nicole. "I encourage anyone who buys one of my crochet patterns to reach out if they want to customise their look, because part of what I'm looking to share with others is the ability to design your own clothes that make you feel powerful and most like yourself! For me, that's colourful,

interesting, and edgier designs – but it can be different for everyone."

The power of sustainability mixed with unique fashion means this rise in modern crochet is liberating the art form, giving power to both designers and consumers. "It's starting to slowly rise over fast fashion," says Sierra. "And crocheting is a simple technique to learn – everyone can have a go. There are so many creators on Instagram who have had such a big impact that it's so hard to ignore. They have shown that it can be fun, it can be sexy, and you can make anything with it."

And with all yarn crafts becoming more inclusive and accessible, anyone can enter the arena. "Also, with climate change still in full swing, I think many people are creating more and shopping less," says Jessica. "The possibilities with crochet are limitless; all you need is yarn, a hook and a pair of scissors to create almost anything you want. And why not create a piece that celebrates your figure and turns heads at the same time?"

invisible join Fasten off and pull loop on hook so that the tail comes out of the top of the final st. Thread the tail onto tapestry needle, insert needle through top of second st of the round from front to back. Insert needle through back loop only of final st of round. Pull so that a false st is created over the first st, trying to keep it the same size as the other sts of the round. Weave in end.

standing st Standing sts are used to join a new colour without a turning ch. Place a slip knot on your hook (this counts as the first loop on your hook), work st as normal holding the slip knot in place with your index finger to prevent it twisting until you finish the st

Fasten off.

Join Pinched Pink with a standing tr in any ch-sp.

Round 3 (2tr, ch3, 3tr) in same ch-sp, ch1, *(3tr, ch3, 3tr) in next ch-sp, ch1; rep from * around, ss to beg st. [70 sts]

Round 4 9tr in next ch-3 sp, dc in next ch-1 sp, 9tr in next ch-3 sp, dc in next ch-1 sp; rep from * around, to top of beg tr. [70 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Pickle with a standing dc in bl of fifth tr of any 9-tr group.

Round 5 (Working in bl throughout), dc in same st, dc in next 9 sts, (2dc in next st, dc in next 9 sts) rep to end, ss in first dc. [77 sts]

Fasten off.

OUTER MANDALA

Join Periwinkle with a standing dc in bl of first st.

Round 6 (Working in bl throughout) dc in same st, 2dc in next st, ch9, skip 9 sts, *2dc in next 2 sts, ch9, skip 9 sts; rep from * around, ss in first dc. [91 sts]

Round 7 Ch1, (does not count as st throughout), dc in first 4 sts, 8dc in ch-sp, (dc in next 4 sts, 8dc in ch-sp) rep around, ss to beg st. [84 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Pinched Pink with a standing dc in bl of any st.

Round 8 Dc in bl of each st around, invisible join.

Join Pickle with a standing dtr in of any st.

Round 9 Dtr in st before st at base of standing st, ch1, (skip 1 st, dtr in next st, dtr in skipped st, ch1) rep around, ss to beg st. [126 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Periwinkle with a standing dc in first st.

Round 10 Dc in next st, dc in ch-1 sp, ch3, skip 3 sts, *dc in next 2 sts, dc in next ch-1 sp, ch3, skip



The centre of the mandala is a seven-pointed motif worked in trebles and double trebles

3 sts; rep from * around, ss to beg st.

Round 11 Ss in next dc, ch1, dc in same dc, skip next dc, 6tr in ch-sp, *skip next dc, dc in next dc, skip next dc, 6tr in next ch-sp; rep from * around, ss to beg st. [147 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Pinched Pink with a standing tr in bl of any dc.

Round 12 (Working in bl throughout) Htr in next 2 tr, dc in next 2 tr, htr in next 2 tr, *tr in dc, htr in next 2 tr, dc in next 2 tr, htr in next 2 tr; rep from * around, ss to beg tr.

Fasten off.

Join Pickle with a standing dc in bl of any st.

Round 13 Dc in bl of each st around, invisible join. [147 sts]

Join Periwinkle with a standing dc in dc worked into tr from Round 12.

Round 14 Ch8, skip 6 sts, (dc in next st, ch8, skip 6 sts) rep around, ss to beg st. [189 sts]

Round 15 Ch4 (counts as dtr), (2tr, htr, dc, htr, 2tr) in next ch-sp, *dtr in next dc, (2tr, htr, dc, htr, 2tr) in next ch-sp; rep from * around, ss to top of beg ch-4. [168 sts]

Fasten off.

Join Pinched Pink with a standing dc in any st.

Round 16 Dc in each st around, ss in beg dc.

Fasten off.

Join Pickle with a standing dc in bl of any st.

Round 17 Dc in bl of each st around, invisible join.

Join Periwinkle with a standing dtr in any st.

Round 18 Dtr in st before st at base of standing st, ch1, (skip 1 st, dtr in next st, dtr in skipped st, ch1) rep around, ss to beg st. [252 sts]

JOIN TO HOOP

Work next round around the hoop to join the Mandala.

Round 19 Ch1, dc in each st and ch around, invisible join. Weave in all ends.

BAG

BASIC GRANNY SQUARES (MAKE 18)

Make 3 in each colour combination.
Using Yarn H (D: I: F: A: E), make a magic loop.
Round 1 (RS) Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), 2tr in loop, ch2, (3tr in loop, ch2) 3 times, ss to top of beg ch-3. [12 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

Join Yarn E (G: H: I: D: B) in any ch-2 sp.

Round 2 (RS) Ch3, (2tr, ch2, 3tr) in same sp, (3tr, ch2, 3tr) in each ch-2 sp around, ss to top of beg ch-3. [24 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

Join Yarn B (A: F: E: H: C) in any ch-2 sp.

Round 3 (RS) Ch3, (2tr, ch2, 3tr) in same sp, *3tr in sp between 3-tr groups, (3tr, ch2, 3tr) in ch-2 sp; rep from * around, ss to top of beg ch-3. [36 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Join Yarn A (I: B: H: F: D) in any ch-2 sp.

Round 4 (RS) Ch3, (2tr, ch2, 3tr) in same sp, *3tr in next 2 sps between 3-tr groups, (3tr, ch2, 3tr) in ch-2 sp; rep from * around, ss to top of beg ch-3. [48 sts, 4 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

HEART SQUARES (MAKE 4)

Using Yarn E throughout, work as Basic Granny Square.

HEART

Using Yarn D, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch3, 13tr in loop, ss to top of beg ch-3. [14 sts]

Round 2 Ch3, tr in st at base of ch-3, 2dtr in next st, 2tr in next st, 2htr in next 2 sts, 2tr in next st, 2dtr in next 2 sts, pm in between 2nd and 3rd dtr to mark base of Heart, 2tr in next st, 2htr in next 2 sts, 2tr in next st, 2dtr in next st, tr in next st, ch3, ss in st at base of last tr. [28 sts]

Fasten off.

For the next round, make 2 using Yarn C and 2 using Yarn H.

Join yarn in first st after marker.

Round 3 Ch2 (counts as dc, ch1), (dc, in next st, ch1) 13 times, dc in sp at top of Heart, ch1, (dc, in next st, ch1) rep to end, ss to first ch of beg ch-2.

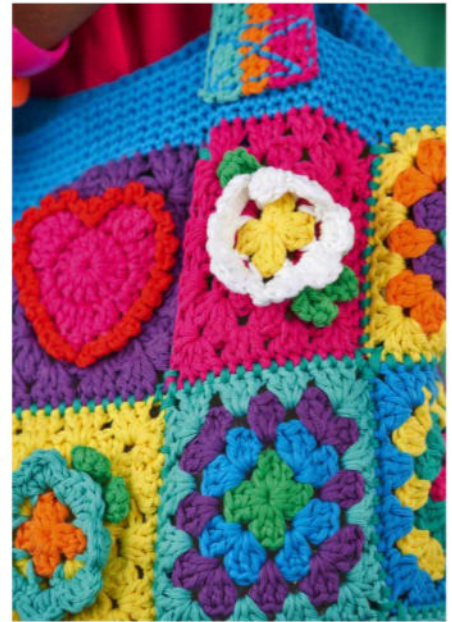
Fasten off.

Sew to the RS of the Square.

FLOWER SQUARES (MAKE 8)

Flowers are worked in 2 colourways. Make 4 in each colourway.

Work as the Basic Granny square using Yarn B (A) for Round 1, and Yarn A (D) for Rounds 2-4.



The flower is worked straight onto the square, while the other motifs are worked separately

FLOWER

The Flower is worked directly onto the Granny Square.

Join Yarn H (J) into any ch-2 sp from Round 1, before the base of the sts from Round 2.

Round 1 (RS) *Ch3, ss in same sp after the base of sts from Round 2, ch3, ss in next ch-2 sp before the base of the sts from Round 2; rep from * 3 times more working final ss in base of beg ch-3. [8 ch-sp]

Round 2 Ss to beg ch-3 sp, ch1 (does not count as st throughout), (dc, 3tr, dc) in each ch-sp around, ss to beg dc.

Fasten off.

LEAVES (MAKE 24)

Using Yarn F, ch6.

Round 1 (RS) Ss in second ch from hook, htr in next ch, tr in next ch, htr in next ch, ss in last ch.

Fasten off.

Sew 3 Leaves to each Flower Square, behind the petals.

TOADSTOOL SQUARE (MAKE 4)

Work as the Basic Granny Square using Yarn F for Rounds 1-3, and Yarn I for Round 4.

TOADSTOOL

Using Yarn C, ch9.

Row 1 (WS) Tr in fourth ch from hook and each ch across, turn. [7 sts]

Row 2 (RS) Skip first 3 sts, 8tr in next st, skip next 2 sts, ss in final st.

Fasten off.

Using Yarn I, embroider spots on the Toadstool.

STEM

Using Yarn J, ch5.

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook and next 2 ch, 3htr in final ch, turn to work down opposite edge of foundation ch, dc in next 3 ch.

Fasten off.

Using the image as a guide, sew the Stem and Toadstool to the Square.

TO MAKE UP

All Squares are joined together using a double crochet seam with WS facing. Use Yarn F for all joining.

Join 3 Basic Granny Squares into a strip to make a side panel. Rep to make a second side panel.

Join 4 Basic Granny Squares into a strip to make the base.

Join any 12 Squares into a 4x3 panel to make the Front. Rep with the rem Squares to make the Back.

Join all the panels together to form the Bag.

UPPER EDGING

Join Yarn I in any st around top of Bag.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, dc in each st and ch-sp around, ss to beg dc. [140 sts]

Rounds 2-7 Ch1, dc in each st around, ss to beg dc.

Fasten off.

STRAPS (MAKE 2)

Using Yarn D, ch100.

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook and each ch across, turn. [99 sts]

Row 2 Ch1, dc in each st across, turn.

Rows 3-9 As Row 2, changing to Yarn B at the end of Row 3 and to Yarn H at the end of Row 6.

Fasten off and weave in all ends.

Using the image as a guide, sew the Straps to the top of the Bag.

Add sturdy double crochet straps in a striped pattern



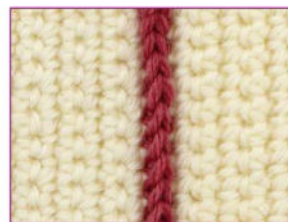
SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO WORK A DOUBLE CROCHET SEAM



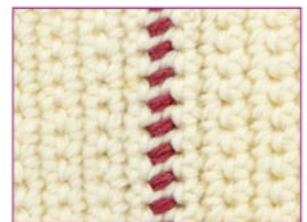
1 First, make sure you fasten off, weave in ends and block pieces. Place pieces WS together. With a slip knot on the hook, insert it into the far right stitch on both pieces, work a slip st.



2 Make 1ch (the t-ch for dc). Insert hook into the second stitch of both layers and work a dc stitch. Work more dc stitches in this way along the edge, as far as you need to.



3 Fasten off, weave in ends, open out the seam and lightly press from the WS. This makes a raised seam for a decorative effect on the RS (see above), using any colour of yarn.



4 In step 1, if you place the pieces with RS together and work the seam, you'll create a more subtle effect on the RS (see above), with the raised seam on the WS.

Brentfox Yarns

Meet an indie dyer and indulge in a design with their skeins



Dyeing yarn is a recent addition to Sally Scanlon's creative roster. The Gloucestershire-based printmaker and textile artist creates designs inspired by nature and the

countryside, and is fond of using techniques like collagraph printmaking.

Sally first began dyeing yarn three years ago. "I'd been eco-dyeing on silk for some time and loved the soft colours I achieved from locally foraged plants," she says. "A friend gave me some Cotswold fleeces, which I sent away to be spun, together with some Jacob wool that was also farmed in Gloucestershire. I decided to set up Brentfox Yarns when I had enough to take to a festival."

A LOVE OF NATURE

Nature and its beauty is central to all of

Sally's art, including her yarn dyeing. Growing up on the edge of Dartmoor has given her a lifelong love of the countryside and an emotional connection to the land. She brings all this to her art.

Sally is also keen to promote the yarn from British native breed sheep. "I dye a variety of yarns, some of which are imported, but British native breed wools are special," she says. "The Cotswold is my favourite yarn because of its texture and sheen – it takes up the colour beautifully. It's fantastic for lace."

A SUSTAINABLE APPROACH

Sally turns to the wonders of nature to achieve her yarn colours. "I mostly use plants that I collect where I keep my pony," she says. "I always ask permission of the land owner and I don't collect all the plant material from the same plant." On her website, Sally says, "My father taught me from a very early age the importance of treating the landscape

and the things within it with respect, so I'm very careful what I select."

The joy of using plants to dye means there are sometimes some unexpected results. For instance, "when I used eucalyptus it gave me a surprising pinky orange!"

SOFT AND SUBTLE

"The colours of my yarns are soft and subtle and work really well together," says Sally. The final colours of her yarns also inspire Sally's own crafty projects. "I've designed a knitted shawl for my Cotswold yarn which will be available shortly, as well as a handwarmer pattern for the Jacob."

Next, she aims to expand her range of native rare breed wool. "I'd like to explore the possibility of purchasing some more raw fleece to send away for spinning. I have some Gloucestershire alpaca waiting to go!"

NOTES

Each Triangle is constructed in rounds with RS facing throughout.

The Triangles are blocked with starch spray before being joined together.

BUNTING

TRIANGLES (MAKE 7)

Make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch3 (counts as tr throughout), 9tr into loop, ss to beg st. [10 sts]

Round 2 Ch3 (tr, dtr, 2tr) in st at base of ch-3, dc in next st, *(2tr, dtr, 2tr) in next st, dc in next st; rep from * 3 times more, ss to beg st. [30 sts]

Round 3 Ss to first dtr, ch1, *dc in dtr, ch4, skip 2 sts, htr in next dc, ch4, skip 2 sts; rep from * 4 times more, ss to beg dc. [10 sts, 10 ch-4 sps]

Round 4 Ss into ch-4 sp, ch3, 3tr in same sp, 4tr in each ch-4 sp around, ss to top of beg ch-3. [40 sts]

Round 5 Ch1, *dc in first 2 sts, htr in first 2 sts, tr in next 2 sts, (2dtr, ch2, 2dtr) in next st, tr in next 2 sts, htr in next 2 sts, dc in next 2 sts; rep from * twice more, dc in final st, ss to beg dc. [48 sts, 3 ch-2 sps]

[48 sts, 3 ch-2 sps]

Fasten off.

Rejoin yarn in first ch-2 sp.

Round 6 *Skip 1 st, **5tr in next st, skip 1 st, dc in next st, skip next st; rep from ** across to next ch-2 sp; rep from * to next ch-2 sp, dc in ch-sp, dc in each st across, dc in final ch-sp, ss to beg tr.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

TO MAKE UP

Pin out the Triangles and spray with starch to set the shape.

Once dry, the Bunting can be assembled.



To ensure the triangles lay flat, spray them with starch before joining them into bunting

Ch50, *dc in each st across straight edge on any Triangle, ch10; rep from * until all Triangles have been joined, ch40.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO MAKE A DOUBLE TREBLE



1 Yrh twice and insert the hook under the top 2 loops of the stitch indicated. Yrh and draw through the stitch only (4 loops on hook).



2 Yrh and pull the yarn through the first 2 loops only (3 loops on hook).



3 Yrh and pull the yarn through the first 2 loops only (2 loops on hook).



4 Yrh and pull the yarn through the remaining 2 loops. There's your double treble made and you'll have 1 loop left on your hook ready to do the next stitch.

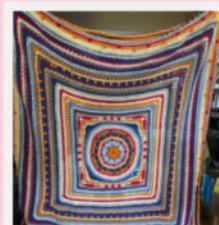

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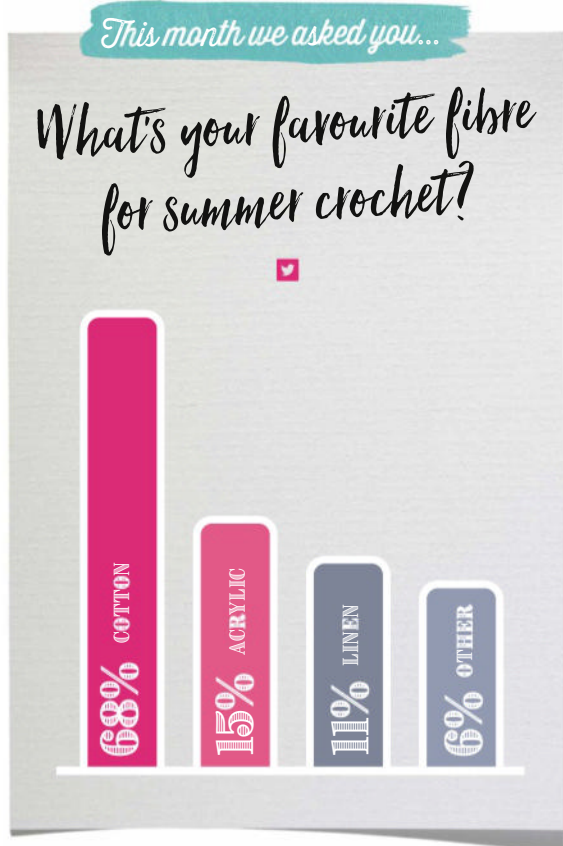

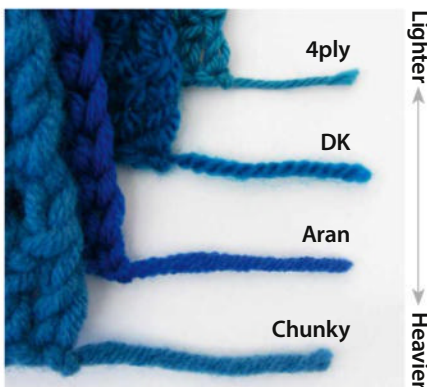

WHAT DOES YARN 'WEIGHT' MEAN?



Brush up on your technique with our simple guide...

Yarn weight has nothing to do with how much your ball weighs – it's all about the thickness of the yarn strand. A thinner yarn is described as 'finer' or 'lighter' weight, while thicker yarns are referred to as 'bulkier' or 'heavier' weight.

Modern yarns can be labelled with all sorts of thickness names and each size feels different when hooked into fabric, so each size creates different effects for your

projects. The names also have interesting histories – you can read these online.

None of this matters much if you use the exact recommended yarn. But if that's not possible, or you want a different colour or effect, or the pattern quotes a yarn weight you've never heard of, then yarn thickness becomes important. In this workshop, I'll explain all about yarn thicknesses and more.

WHAT ARE THE DIFFERENT YARN WEIGHTS?

Here's our handy guide...

See below for our guide to converting different yarn weights – you can use it when you're buying yarn or following a pattern. Our UK readers may find it particularly useful when using patterns using US

terms. Our guide is compiled through extensive research of various sources. However, if you're ever in any doubt, make a test swatch of the yarn and compare it to your pattern's quoted tension.

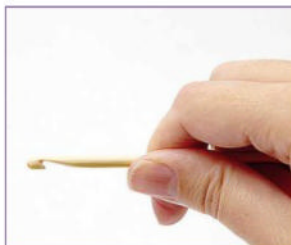
HOLDING THE HOOK

Try these methods and see which works best



PENCIL METHOD

Hold the hook like a pencil, in your right hand (if you're right-handed), about 3-5cm from the hooked end. If your hook has a flat area, you'll find it comfortable to hold it here.



KNIFE METHOD

Hold the hook between your thumb and forefinger, about 3-5cm from the hooked end, resting the end of the hook against your palm. This will give you lots of control.

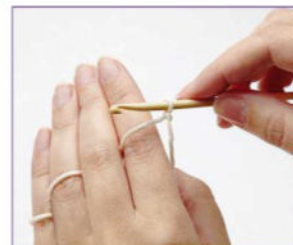
HOLDING THE YARN

Even tension results in even stitches



METHOD ONE

Pass the ball end of the yarn between the little finger and third fingers of your left hand (if you are right-handed), then behind the third and middle fingers, over your index finger.



METHOD TWO

Loop the ball end of the yarn loosely around the little finger of your left hand, then take it over the third finger, behind the middle finger and over your index finger.

MAKING A SLIPKNOT The first loop on the hook



1 Hold the tail of the ball of yarn in your left hand and drape the yarn clockwise over the top of it to form a loose, circular loop.



2 Hold the loop between left thumb and forefinger, then insert the crochet hook through the centre of the loop from front to back.

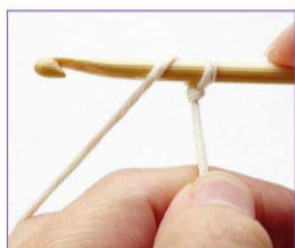


3 Catch the ball end of the yarn with the hook and pull it back through the centre of the loop, taking the yarn through with it.



4 Pull both ends of the yarn to tighten the knot, then pull just the ball end to tighten the loop so it's close to the hook, but not touching it.

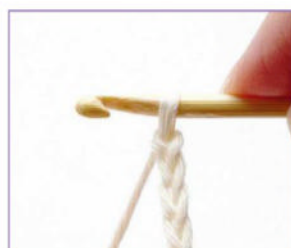
CHAIN STITCH Use this stitch to make your foundation chain



1 Hold the hook in your right hand, and both the yarn end and the working yarn in your left hand. Move the hook under and over the yarn to wrap it around anticlockwise.



2 Pull the hook towards the slipknot, catching the yarn in the hook, and pulling it through the slipknot loop. This forms your first chain (ch) stitch. Repeat steps 1 and 2 to form a chain length.



3 This is what your row of chains will look like. Hold the chain with your left hand near the hook, to keep the tension. Keep going until you have the number of chains that's stated in your pattern.

How to count chains



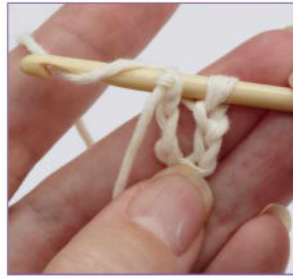
Each chain or loop counts as one stitch. Never count your first slipknot or the loop on the hook (called the working loop). So that you can be accurate, make sure the chain is not twisted and that the front is facing you.

SLIP STITCH (ss)

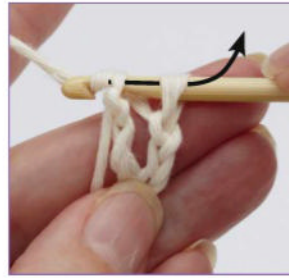
This stitch has no height – often used to join rounds



1 You can make a slip stitch in any chain or stitch, to join it to the working loop on the hook. To make a slip stitch, simply insert the hook into the stitch indicated, from front to back.



2 Catch the ball end of the yarn with the hook, so the yarn wraps anticlockwise around it (yarn round hook, or yrh).



3 Gently pull the hook, and the yarn wrapped around it, back towards the 2 loops on the hook. Draw the yarn through both the loops on the hook.



4 This will finish the stitch and you'll see how the slip stitch has joined the working loop to the chain or stitch you inserted the hook into. You can also use slip stitch to form a neat edging.

DOUBLE CROCHET (dc) US term: single crochet

One of the key stitches in crochet, doubles are simple, compact stitches that form a dense fabric



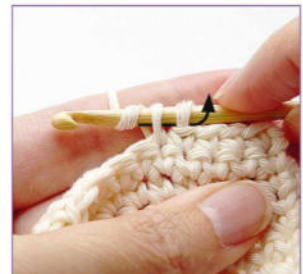
1 To make a double crochet stitch, insert the hook under the top 2 loops of the next stitch on the previous row.



2 Wind the yarn around the hook (yrh).



3 Pull the yarn through the stitch, giving you 2 loops on your crochet hook.



4 Yarn round hook again, then pull the yarn through both loops. There's your double crochet made and you'll have one loop left on the hook, ready to do the next stitch.

HALF TREBLE CROCHET (htr) US term: half double crochet

A handy stitch that's between double and treble crochet in size, and it looks slightly looser than double crochet



1 To make a half treble crochet stitch, work to where you want the htr and then wind the yarn round the hook (yrh).



2 Insert the hook under the top 2 loops of the next stitch in the previous row. Wrap yarn around the hook again (yrh).



3 Pull the yarn through the stitch only (3 loops on hook).



4 Yarn round hook again, pull the yarn through all 3 loops. You've made a half treble crochet. Continue working htr into next and following sts to the end of the row.

TREBLE CROCHET (tr) US term: double crochet

One of the most popular stitches in crochet, this simple stitch is twice as high as a double crochet stitch



1 To work a treble crochet, start by winding yrh and then insert the hook under the top 2 loops of the stitch on the previous row.



2 Wrap the yarn around the hook (yrh) and pull the yarn through the stitch only.



3 You will now have 3 loops on the hook. Yrh again, and draw the yarn through just the first 2 loops on the hook.



4 You will now have 2 loops on the hook. Yrh again and draw the yarn through the remaining loops on the hook. Your treble crochet is complete.

WORKING IN ROWS

Follow these simple rules to construct crochet fabric



1 The first row is made by working across the foundation chain from right to left. At the end of the chain or row, turn the work so that the yarn is behind the hook.



2 For the next row, first make the turning chain for the stitch you're about to work (see opposite). Now work the next stitch into the top of the stitches on your first row, missing the first stitch.

WORKING STITCHES INTO A RING

To make circles, tubes and other shapes



1 Make a foundation ring and work the t-ch (3ch for treble sts). Work a treble st as usual, but insert hook into centre of ring. For treble sts, yrh, insert hook into ring.



2 Finish the treble, as usual (yrh, pull yarn through ring, yrh, pull yarn through first 2 loops, yrh, pull yarn through 2 loops). Work more sts into the ring as needed.

DOUBLE TREBLE CROCHET (dtr)

US term: treble crochet

This is a stitch regularly used as an elongated version of the treble (described above). It's worked in a very similar way to the treble, as follows:

- 1** Make a foundation chain. Skip 4ch, *yrh twice, and insert the hook under the top loop of the next ch.
- 2** Yrh, pull the yarn through the ch loop only (4 loops on hook).
- 3** Yrh and pull the yarn through 2 loops only (3 loops on hook).

Yrh and pull the yarn through 2 loops only (2 loops on hook).

- 4** Yrh and pull the yarn through the remaining 2 loops. Repeat from * to make more dtr sts.
- 5** To make the next row of dtr, turn work and ch4. This turning chain counts as the first dtr in a new row. Skip first st at the base of the t-ch, work 1dtr under the top 2 loops of the second stitch in the previous row; continue to the end of the row.

TRIPLE TREBLE CROCHET (ttr)

US term: double treble crochet

This is one of the longest standard crochet stitches and is mainly used in fancy stitch patterns. It's taller than a double treble crochet stitch (described left) and is worked in a very similar way, as follows:

- 1** Make a foundation ch. Skip 5 ch, *yrh 3 times, insert hook under top loop of next ch.
- 2** Yrh, pull yarn through ch loop only (5 loops on hook).
- 3** † Yrh, draw loop through

2 loops only. Repeat from † 3 times more and your triple treble will be finished. Repeat from * to make more ttr sts.

- 4** To make the next row, turn work and ch5. This turning chain counts as the first triple treble in a new row. Skip first st at base of the t-ch. Work 1 triple treble, inserting hook under the top 2 loops of the second st in the previous row; continue to the end of the row.

Whether you hook this for yourself or for a puzzle-loving friend, this is one jumper that's sure to be a perfect fit! It's also a great introduction to tapestry colourwork.

NOTES

Jumper is worked in htr from bottom up in separate pieces for Front, Back and Sleeves. A Collar is added once pieces are seamed. The jigsaw puzzle section is worked in dc following the Chart on page 43. Each square counts as 1dc stitch. Read RS rows from right to left and WS rows from left to right. Change colour in the last yrh of the previous st. Work over the unused yarn to enclose it in the dc stitches. You may need to use a larger hook size to maintain the same stitch tension as the htr sts over the colourwork section.

JUMPER

FRONT

Using Yarn A, ch101 (111: 121: 131).

Row 1 (RS) Htr in second ch from hook and in each ch to end, turn. [100 (110: 120: 130) sts]

Rows 2-10 Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), htr in each st to end, turn.

Fasten off.

PUZZLE SECTION

Join Yarns B and C.

Follow the Chart on page 43, working Rows 1-30 and then repeating Rows 10-20. Row 1 is written out below to help you follow the Chart.

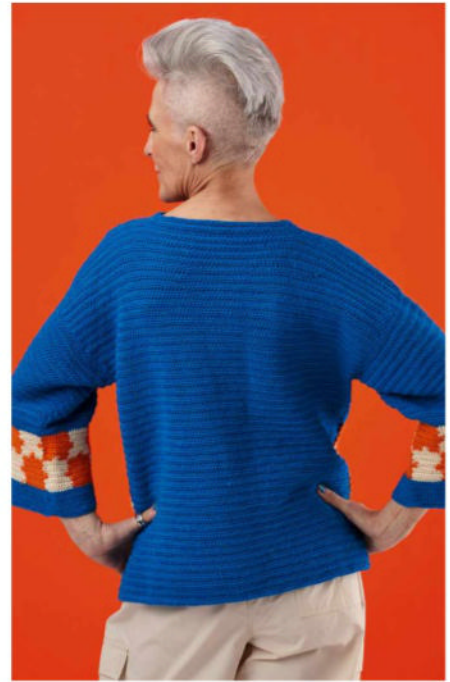
Row 1 (RS) Using Yarn B, ch1, 10dc, (change to Yarn C, 10dc, change to Yarn B, 10dc) repeat to end, turn. [10 (11: 12: 13) puzzle pieces]

Rows 2-40 As Row 1, using the chart for all colour changes.

Fasten off Yarns B and C.

FRONT TO SHOULDER

Join Yarn A in first st with RS facing and work in



The slouchy design features dropped shoulders for a super-comfortable fit

htr as Row 2 until work measures approx 58 (60: 62: 64)cm ending with WS row.

FIRST SHOULDER

Row 1 (RS) Ch1, 32 (36: 40: 44) htr, turn leaving rem sts unworked.

[32 (36: 40: 44) sts]

Row 2 Ch1, htr in each st to end.

Fasten off.

SECOND SHOULDER

Skip central 36 (38: 40: 42) sts and rejoin Yarn A in next st.

Repeat Rows 1-2 of First Shoulder.

Fasten off.

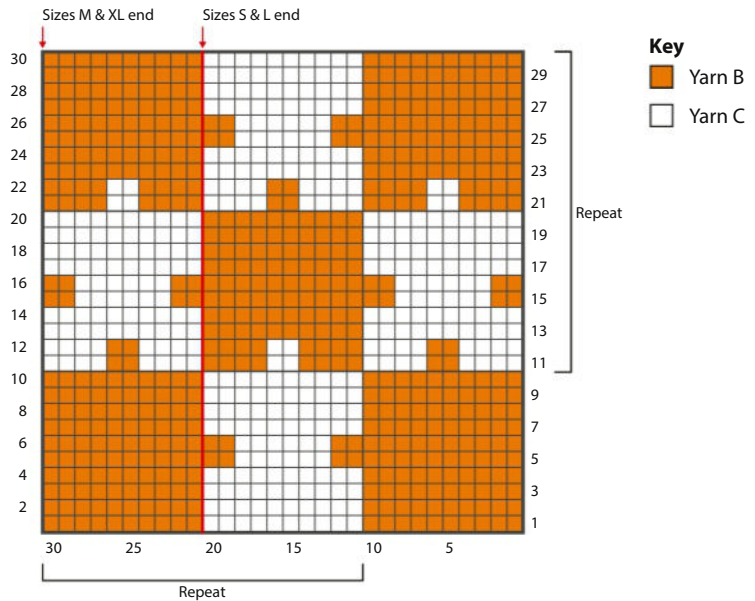


Work just two repeats, which is 20 rows, of the jigsaw puzzle on the cuffs of the sleeves



Work the jigsaw puzzle colourwork on the front of the jumper, as well as the sleeves

Jigsaw jumper chart



BACK

Work as for Front without puzzle section until piece measures same length to shoulder as Front to Shoulder, ending with WS row. Repeat First and Second Shoulder as for Front.

SLEEVES (MAKE 2)

CUFF

With Yarn A, ch81 (91: 101: 111).

Row 1 (RS) Dc in second ch from hook and in each stitch to end, turn. [80 (90: 100: 110) sts]

Rows 2-10 Ch1, dc in each st to end, turn.

Fasten off.

PUZZLE SECTION

Join Yarns B and C.

Follow the Chart on above, working Rows 1-20.

[8 (9: 10: 11) puzzle pieces]

Fasten off Yarns B and C.

MAIN SLEEVE

Join Yarn A with RS facing and work in htr until work measures approx 32cm.

TO MAKE UP

Sew shoulder seams. Align top centre of Sleeve with shoulder and sew Sleeves to Front and

Back. Sew underarm and side seams leaving the bottom 10 rows (below puzzle section) open.

COLLAR

Join Yarn A at shoulder seam of neck opening with RS facing.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, htr evenly around neck opening, ss to first htr, turn.

Rounds 2-4 Ch1, htr in each st around, ss to first htr, turn.

Fasten off.

Weave in all ends and block to measurements.

SIMPLE STEPS HOW TO WORK TAPESTRY COLOURWORK



1 Work to the point where you want to change colour and on the last stitch in the first colour, work the final yrh using the second colour.



2 Work a stitch using the second colour, but hold the working end of the first colour on top of the stitches below and make sure you work the new stitch over the top of it, effectively encasing the first colour.



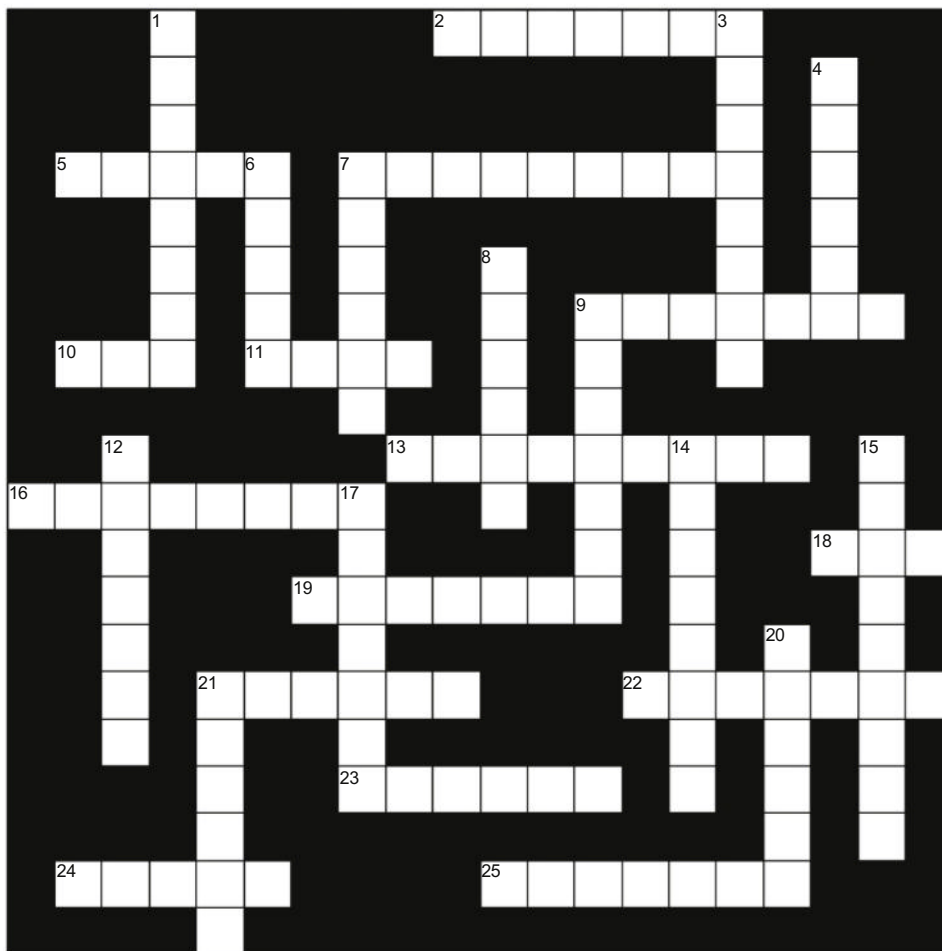
3 Continue working in this way, encasing the working end of the first colour. When you want to change colour again, use the same method as before: on the last stitch in the second colour, work the final yrh using the first colour.



4 It's important not to pull too tightly on the previous colour of yarn or it will pucker the fabric. Continue to work stitches using the first colour, over the top of the working end of the second colour.

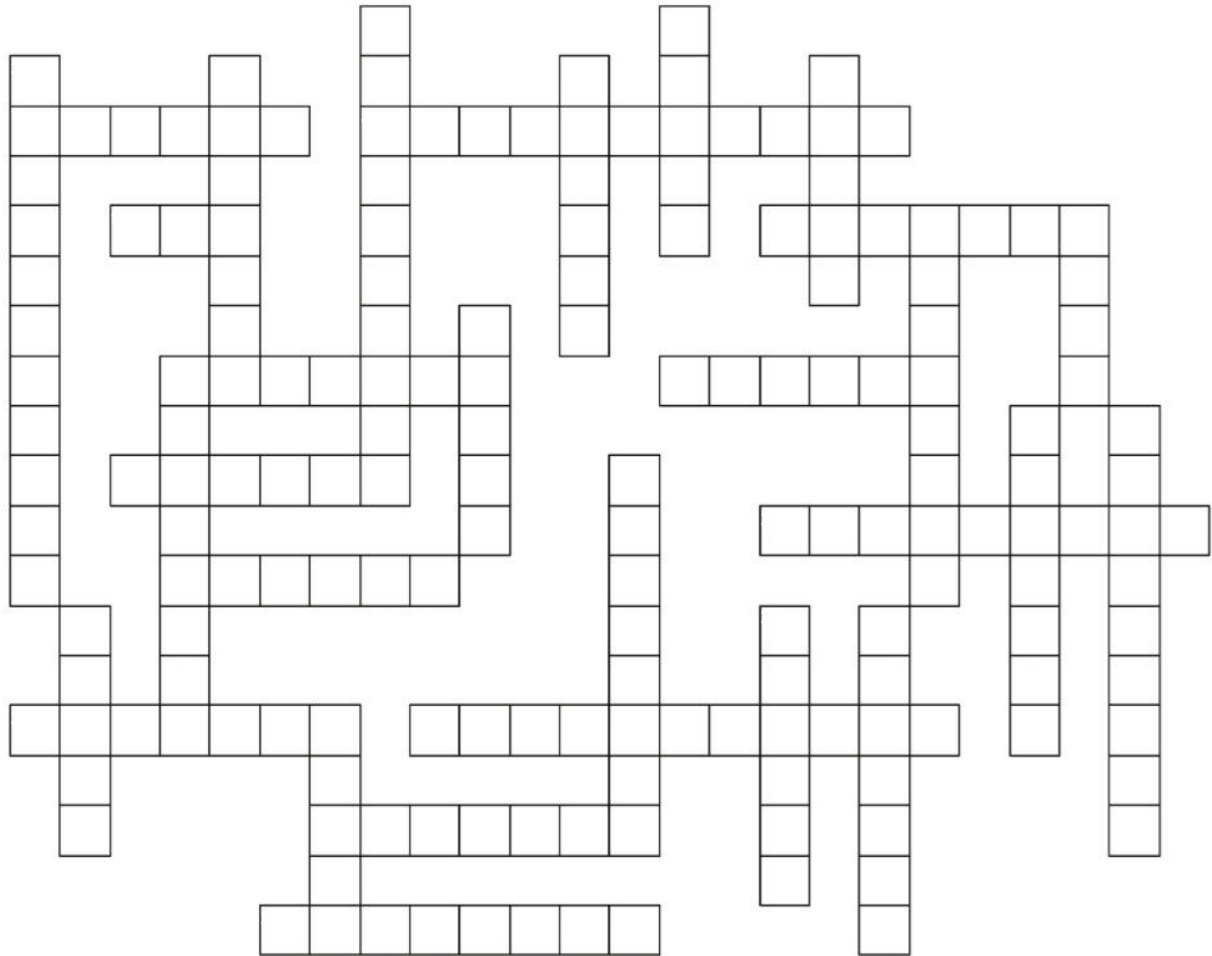

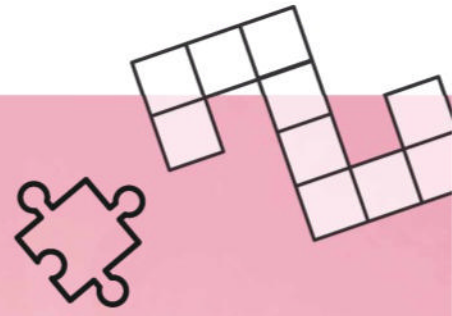

Rounds 12-18 Dc in each st around.

Stuff as you work.

Round 19 (6dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [42 sts]

Round 20 (5dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [36 sts]

Round 21 (4dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [30 sts]

Round 22 (3dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [24 sts]

Round 23 (2dc, dc2tog) 6 times. [18 sts]

Round 24 (Dc2tog) 9 times. [9 sts]

Fasten off.

Thread tail through fl of final 9 sts and pull tight to close.

Using Liquorice, embroider eyes over Rounds 14-15 approx 9 sts apart.

Using Biscuit, embroider a nose between Rounds 14-15, 3 sts wide. Wrap the yarn 8 times around the horizontal line for volume.

Using black stranded cotton, and the image as a guide, embroider a v-shaped mouth on Doll A and a straight mouth on Doll B.

CHEEKS (MAKE 2 PER DOLL)

Using Piggy, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 5dc into loop. [5 sts]

Round 2 2dc in each st around, ss to beg dc. [10 sts]

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Sew Cheeks next to eyes, over Rounds 15-18.

EARS (MAKE 2 PER DOLL)

Using Biscuit, make a magic loop.

Round 1 (RS) Ch1, 5htr into loop. [5 sts]



Embroider a differently shaped mouth, and add hair ties in green yarn for Doll B

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Sew Ears on each side of Head, between Rounds 14-16, 6 sts away from eyes.

For Doll A, embroider French knots for the earrings using Melon.

HAIR

Using Liquorice, make a magic loop.

Rounds 1-7 (RS) As Rounds 1-7 of Head. [42 sts]

Round 8 (6dc, 2dc in next st) 6 times. [48 sts]

Round 9 (15dc, 2dc in next st) 3 times. [51 sts]

Rounds 10-13 Dc in each st around.

Round 14 10dc, 5htr, 8tr, 1htr, 1dc, 1ss, 1dc, 1htr, 8tr, 5htr, 10dc.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Sew Hair on Head, with the ss centred with nose, 7 rounds above it.

HAIR BUNS (MAKE 2 PER DOLL)

Using Liquorice, make a magic loop.

Rounds 1-3 (RS) As Rounds 1-3 of Head. [18 sts]

Round 4 (5dc, 2dc in next st) 3 times. [21 sts]

Rounds 5-6 Dc in each st around.

Round 7 (1dc, dc2tog) 7 times. [14 sts]

Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Stuff the Buns and sew to Hair between Rounds 7-11, with approx 12 sts between them at front.

For Doll A, cut 2 strands of Freckle to make ties.

For Doll B, cut 2 strands of Treetop to make ties.

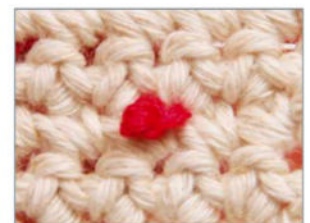

2 Insert needle back into the fabric, very close to where it came out. Tip: you'll need to pierce the fabric, so use a sharp needle.



3 Hold the yarn taut and push the twists of yarn so they sit right up next to the fabric.



4 Pull the needle through gently to form a knot on the surface of the fabric.

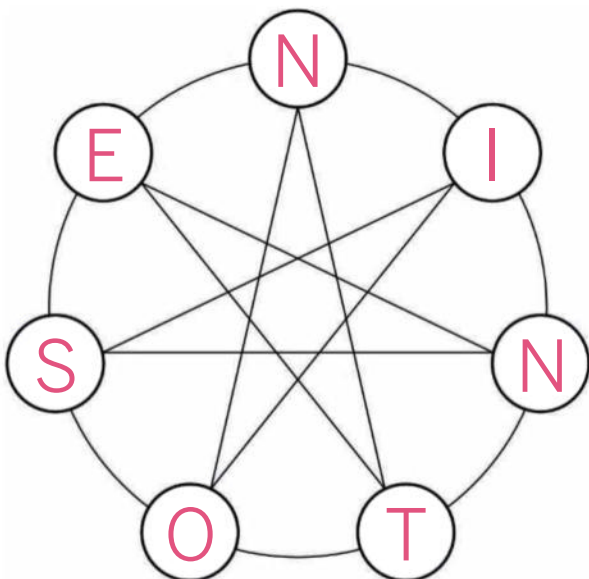

Fasten off.

Join Light Grey Heather in any st.

Rounds 3-4 As Round 2. [232 sts]

Fasten off.

Join White in any st.

Rounds 5-6 As Round 2. [248 sts]

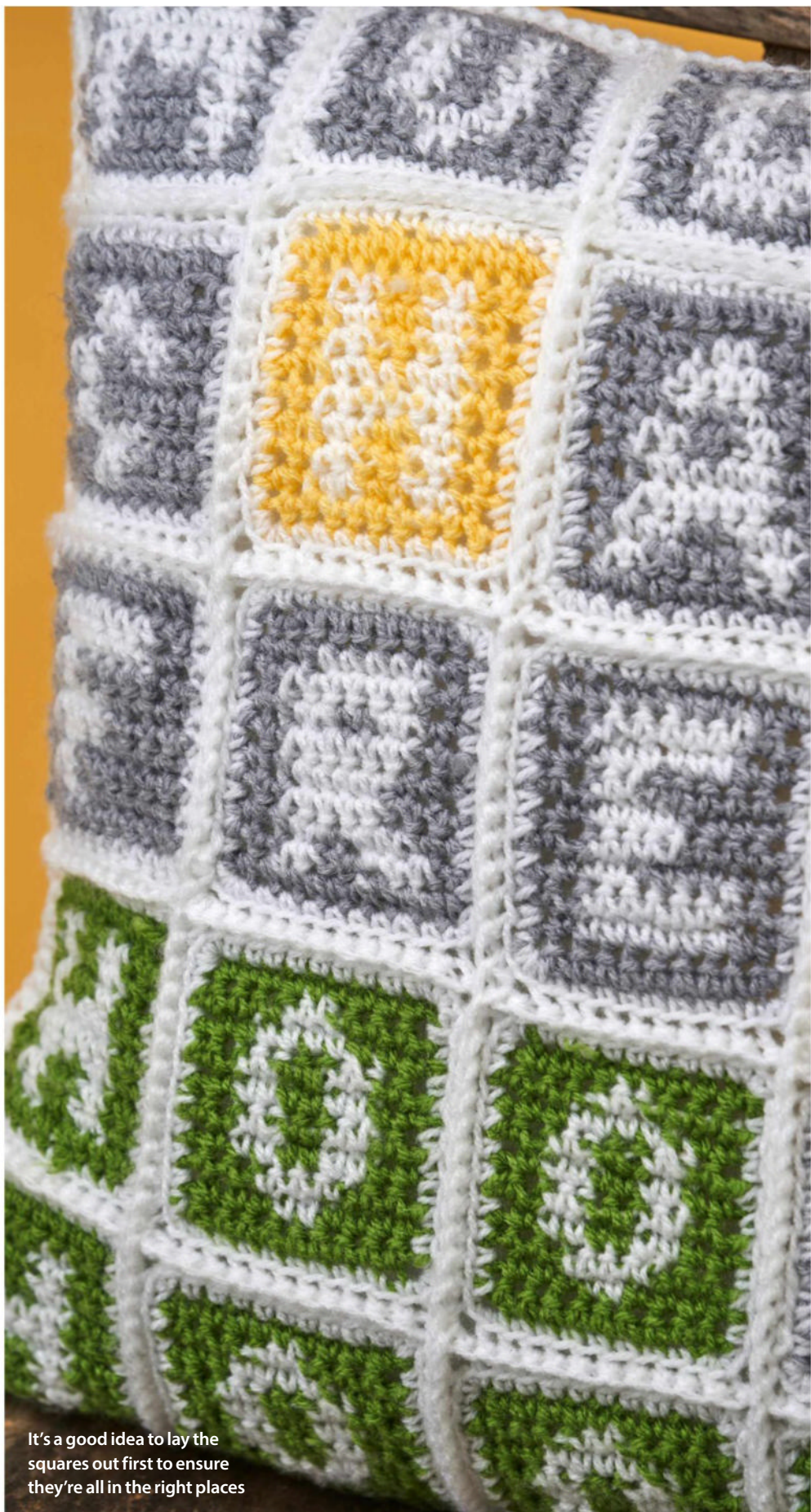
